**Belmont Stakes
To Be Event Of
Saturday, June 8**

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—America's oldest turf fixture—the Belmont stakes—receives its 61st running at Belmont Park tomorrow with the probability that the winner may be crowned the 1929 three-year-old champion.

Restricted to entire colts and fillies, the Belmont is to America what the Derby is to England, both being run over a mile and a half course. Starters must pack scale-weights, colts 125 pounds and fillies 115. There are no penalties or allowances.

Growing close to \$50,000, according to the number of starters, it will pay the winner between \$2,000 and \$40,000 in addition to the gold plate given by Mrs. August Belmont, widow of the first president of the Westchester Racing association under whose auspices the Belmonts have been held since 1886. The race was named after the first August Belmont.

Standing head and shoulders above the field, which will probably number less than a dozen, are three Kentucky-bred colts, Oak Jack High and Dr. Fizzland. The quartette figured in the earlier stages in the withers hills, only the freshman winner being out of the running in that mad dash through the stretch.

Playing Recalls Memories of Days of Barry, Collins, Baker, McInnis.

With each passing day it becomes easier to believe that Baker and Barry and Collins and McInnis are back at their posts again, ready to take the backward trail through baseball history to the day when Cornelius McGillicuddy owned the 100-per cent baseball machine. The Athletics of 1929 battered the Browns shamefully yesterday in a 15 to 4 battle, proving once more their right to wear the mantle of their illustrious predecessors.

It is yet too early to pass out the pennants, but if memory serves, the championships of 1913 and 1914 were as good as awarded to Mr. Mack about April. The third of the 1929 campaign soon will be over, and the Mack promise to pose that stage in such good circumstances that 550 ball will suffice over the rest of the route— as it would have sufficed for the last three Yankee teams. Further, nothing short of a cataclysm can prevent the Mackos from holding the lead on July 4, the traditional date on which pennant soundings are taken.

Yankee's Drop Game
 Cleveland outpointed the Yankees 5 to 7 yesterday as the Athletics made merry with the Browns, while Mr. Mack another neat gain over his nearest competitor. The Yankees and the Browns remained in a virtual tie the seven and one-half games behind the Athletics.

George Pipras was knocked out by the Indians yesterday, and Myles Thomas and Tom Zachary were roughly used after he departed. Tony Lazzeri and Cedric Belfrage made it seem close with a pair of home runs in the eighth.

George Rayburn failed to get the rotate against the Browns in spite of a ten-run lead, but by nevertheless received official credit for the victory. Simmons helped the Mackos with his twelfth homer, using Gehrig for the league lead, while Pate ran in with his tenth.

Detroit called in the eighth for three runs to defeat Washington by 7 to 5, and the White Sox stopped the Reds by 3 to 5.

Nip-and-Tuck Battle
 The nip-and-tuck battle in the National league continued. The Giants edged closer to the real fight by shading the Cardinals, 5 to 4, for the second successive afternoon as the Cubs rallied to defeat Brooklyn, 8 to 6. Pittsburgh increased its lead over the Cards by taking a 4 to 2 decision from the Braves, and the Phillies regained the 500 mark by turning back the Reds, 2 to 0. The Philadelphia Athletics (1929) won their eighth home run in a field goal, Ray Henge outpitched May and Kemmer.

The Giant victory was notable for the pitching come-back of Larry Benton, who has had an in and out spring. Bill Terry helped him, with a homer, Jim Bottomley landed a four-base blow for St. Louis.

**Babe Ruth Will
Be Out of Game
For Many Weeks**

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—The Evening World says today that an overtaxed and weakened heart will keep Babe Ruth out of the Yankees' lineup for at least a month and possibly for the remainder of the season.

The home run king was described as "a pretty sick man." A scabrous lung congestion is taxing his strength and he is fretting over his physicians' ruling that he avoid all excitement. He is not allowed to drive his automobile and he has been refused permission to attend baseball games.

The paper says Ruth's doctor has been visiting him two or three times each night. The exact nature of his illness will not be known for a few days or until Dr. King, the Yankees' physician, turns in his report to the club management.

Until the report of the physician is forthcoming, no definite statement will be made as to the Babe's condition. Long automobile rides into the open country is the medicine prescribed to help bring the Yankee star back to complete health.

Refused Interviews
Newspaper men and most of the visitors are refused interviews and social calls at Ruth's Riverside Drive apartment, partly because of the excitement and partly because of a desire to keep his present condition secret.

Mrs. Ruth, a bride of six months, is in constant attendance and does her share in seeing that Babe obeys the orders of his physician.

It is almost a week since Ruth appeared in the Yankee lineup. Last Saturday he slammed out his tenth home run of the season and then went to the showers, on Monday it was announced that he would be unable to play on account of a heavy cold.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 7 (AP)—Fairland was re-created persons in Los Angeles' huge coliseum last night as the city bid farewell to the ancient Amble Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. The fifty-fifth annual convocation came to an end under a many-hued blaze of lights as the million-dollar electrical pagoda wended its spectacular way around the great bowl.

Following the flickering rainbow fingers of a man-made Aurora Borealis, new worlds whirled through space, yawning caverns belched snow fire, desert caravans were etched in silver and bronze, and gardens of fragile flowers and incandescent beams. The spectacle sent drowsing Shriners to their waiting trains in a bewildering shower of electric magic. Early today the myriad special trains began moving out of the city's railway stations. The exodus was to continue with little reduction in volume until tomorrow. Wholesale strikes in the railway yards, in which thousands of the Shrine visitors had made their homes during the convention were cut loose and rolled east, north and south, with various stopovers arranged.

HELD NEGLIGENT**

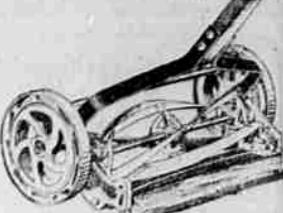
James Bean Under Suspension in Investigation of Virginia Patty Case.

LOS ANGELES, June 7 (AP)—Police Captain James Bean, head of the Los Angeles homicide squad, today was under suspension for "unwarranted negligence" in investigation of the slaying of Mrs. Virginia Patty, and in failure to arrest William L. Tallman, red-haired, red-headed, Deputy Chief James Lyons, who announced the veteran investigator's suspension last night. Captain Bean had been in possession of Tallman's name and description and had been informed of his whereabouts four hours before the suspect, called from San Pedro, Cal., aboard the steamer Admiral Benson last Tuesday afternoon. Tallman escaped from the ship before it docked at San Francisco.

Captain of detectives Al Staten, who took over the direction of the investigation, suggesting Bean assigned additional duty which he said pointed to Tallman as the slayer. These included signature—"W. L. Tallman" and "W. C. Johnson"—on the register at Tallman's hotel, and in the rooming house in which Mrs. Patty's body was found, with head battered, dressed in clothes found in a closet behind a folding bed.

Comparison of the signatures showed sufficient similarity in cursive, Staten said, to establish they had been written by the same person. "W. C. Johnson" was the name investigators said they found Tallman had assumed in his recent association with Mrs. Patty, whom he first met a year ago when he was radio operator at the Admiral Benson. The name also was found on telephone slips in Mrs. Patty's apartment in another section of the city.
