of the export debenture proposal, he declared cheaper rates were given by railroads to steel products and various manufactured articles shipped for export than were accorded agricultural products.

The Texas member denied that the debenture plan was a subsidy, as he said it had been described in newspaper editorials.

Various members of the conference committee explained the changes made in the bill to conform to the conference agreement and declared that the measure in its final form was essentially the same as when it originally was passed by the house.

The house disposed of the measure after little more than an hour of discussion.

No effort was made to obtain a record vote in the house on approval of the report, although several "noes" were heard when the motion was made that it be adopted.
