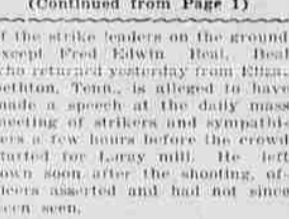
It is charged that Hecmovic gave a check on a bank of Angels Camp, Cal., for \$100 and there were no funds to cover the check.

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—The federal trade commission today issued complaints against nine additional Oregon and California lumber companies charging misrepresentation in the sale of western yellow pine as white pine.

The commission previously had issued complaints against 35 western companies on similar charges. The companies cited today were: Berry and Sons, Westport, Cal.; Quincy Lumber company, Quincy, Cal.; Kesterson Lumber company, Dorris, Cal.; and Shaw Bertram Lumber company, Pelican Bay Lumber company, Klamath Lumber and Box company, Kwanza Box company, and the Big Lark Box company, all of Klamath Falls, Ore.
