

NATIONAL PARK OPENING DATES

All in Northwest Will Open 1929 Season by The First of July.

"All national parks in the Northwest open their 1929 season the last of June or the first of July," stated A. E. Shearer, director of the touring department of the Oregon State Motor association.

"Following are the dates on which all of the national parks are open and this information is given out with the idea that persons planning their vacations will not be disappointed upon reaching their objective to find that the parks are closed:

- Crater Lake, Oregon—July 1 to September 29.
General Grant, California—May 15 to October 1.
Glacier, Montana—June 15 to September 15.
Grand Canyon, Arizona—open all the year.
Hawaii, Hawaiian Islands—open all the year.
Lafayette, Maine—open all the year (Summer season June 15 to Oct. 15).

Urges Using Gas Best Fitted For Your Automobile

Although the chamber of commerce registers scores and scores of out-of-state automobiles during the year, it is very rarely that a car is driven here bearing an European license.

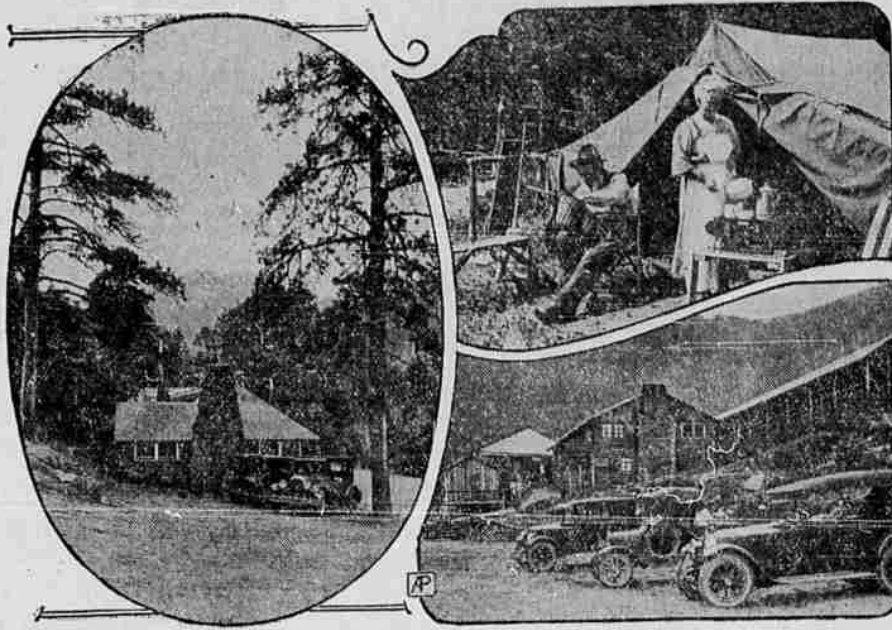

Nation's Forests Ready For Tourists



As the long trail beckons to vacationing tourists they will find many of the comforts of home this year in the rugged wilderness of the national forests.

COLORADO SPRINGS (AP)—Automobile tourists and campers who are starting on their long joyous summer jaunts like the wilds, but they look for real stoves and beds with springs.

Although beside cascading waterfalls and under murmuring pines, the present day outdoor dweller prefers a hint of comfort even in the wilderness, according to observations of the United States forest service.

The foresters divide the travelers into three classes—nomads, semi-nomads, and summer residents.

And the nomad who once exulted in sleeping under the stars now prefers a real bed. He has a sneaking fondness for a small stove instead of a glowing bed of coals for his bacon and eggs.

For this reason, the lure of the privately operated pay camp is increasing. The forest service is encouraging the obtaining of permits for such camps where tourists can obtain the small comforts and luxuries they desire and which the government can only meet with the simplest facilities.

In some of the camps the government has installed a modern system of sanitation, stone fireplaces shelter houses, information booths and other conveniences.

Last year more than 23,000,000 people visited the national forests,

which embrace at least part of every important mountain system and every important forest region within the nation. Over 20,000,000 went by automobile.

To the man or woman dreaming of scented stillness beside waterfalls, deep, quiet pools or rugged mountain trails, the national forests put his dream within reach when national and state parks may be too far away. Permits are given individuals who wish to establish private camps, build summer homes or small hotels, provided they comply with regulations.

The coast ranges of the Pacific, the Cascades, the Sierra Nevadas, the Rocky mountains, the Black Hills, the Ozark mountains and the White mountains of New England all offer refuge and solace to those trying to forget everyday cares of existence.
