BERRY PRICES GO DOWN IN OREGON

Best can be Bought \$1.50 to \$1.75 in Portland Market Today.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11 (AP)—Strawberry prices hit the lowest mark of the season today. The best could be bought from wholesalers at \$1.50 to \$1.75, with the off-grade below these figures. Growers who sold early direct to retailers or others received, considerably less. Much of the fruit is not up to the standard. Three, four and even five boxes for 25 cents have not been exceptional at some retail stands, according to the quality. Eggs, butter, poultry and fresh meat prices were unchanged. Local peas were plentiful at 9 and 10 cents a pound. The same statement applies to lettuce with prices ranging from 75 cents to \$1.25 a crate, depending on quality. Cantaloupes were scarce and prices were firmer.

WHEAT IS TWO CENTS HIGHER THAN MONDAY

CHICAGO, June 11 (AP)—Wheat scored quick advances today after an early setback that was associated with uncertainty over the senate vote today on farm relief. Strong orders to purchase on declines led however, to a sharp rally, with much of the buying attributed to the east. Opening 1/2 to 2c down, wheat rebounded to well above yesterday's finish. Corn also developed strength, starting 1/2 cent to 3/4 cents off, and subsequently showing gains. Oats were relatively weak. Provisions held about steady.

Wheat closed unsettled 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 c above yesterday's finish, corn 3/4 to 2 1/2 c up, oats 1/2 to 3/4 c advance, and provisions varying from 2 decline to a rise of 35.

Stock Market In An Upward Trend

NEW YORK, June 11 (AP)—The stock market turned upward after an early sinking spell today but trading continued rather dull. Fear of a mid-month credit stringency kept small speculation out of the market, and tended to postpone operations of professional traders except in a few issues, in which special developments are pending.

A better tone developed in the late trading when chemical and public utilities shares were in demand. Commercial Solvents rose 12 points to a new high at 410. Allied Chemical advanced 8 points and Commonwealth Power touched 295, having sold 19 points below that figure in the morning. The close was steady with sales approximating 2,000,000 shares.

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Young Man Shot Early Today By Border Officer

DETROIT, June 11 (AP)—Archibald Eugster, 21, was probably fatally wounded early today by a bullet said to have been fired by Joseph Cox, a customs border patrol inspector who was guarding a rum runner's motorboat on the river Rouge.

According to two of the wounded youth's companions, Raymond Mallick, 21, and Joseph Lakatos, 20, they were on their way to fish in the Detroit river when they were attracted by shots. The youths left their motorboat and went to investigate. Mallick said he was walking behind Eugster when the youth was shot and saw a man wearing a customs officer's cap appear from behind a bush. Patrolman Clayton Fleming who questioned Cox, said the customs agent refused to admit he had shot Eugster but did not deny he had fired several shots in the air when he saw the youths pass in a motorboat.

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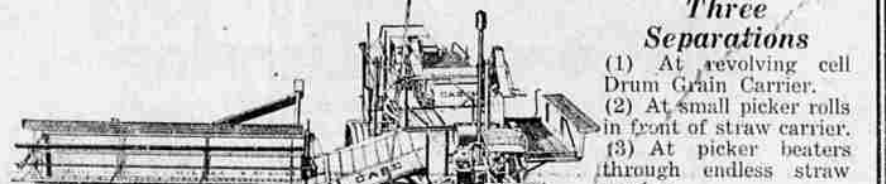

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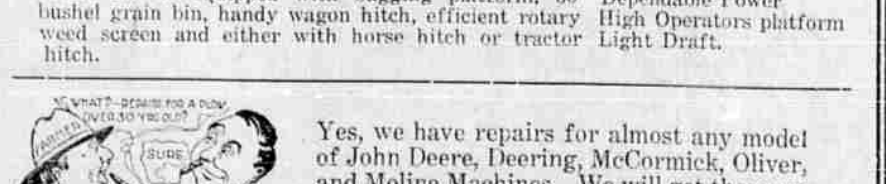
