Found guilty of giving unauthorized exhibitions with professionals, Miss Norelius was indefinitely suspended and Miss Meady declared "ineligible to compete as an amateur" by the registration committee of the A. A. U. yesterday.

It was this same body which, in February, set down Ray Harbo, Olympic 400-meter champion, after he had charged that officials of track had paid excess expense money to star performers.

In announcing its decision, the committee ruled that Miss Norelius, 400-meter free style swimming champion at the last Olympics, must give up all prizes she won at the national women's championship at Chicago.
