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## Church Summer School Opens At Cove Monday

**COVE, Ore., (Special)**—The Eastern Oregon Summer school for church workers will begin Monday June 17 and continue for ten days. The French hall is now completed and the carpenters are building another cabin. There are already four cabins and this will make the fifth. These cabins are used for dormitories for the girl students. Besides the Rev. W. P. Remington and the clergy of the district, the faculty will include the Very Rev. Herbert H. Powell, dean of the church divinity school of the Pacific at San Francisco, Miss Edna Eastwood of New York, secretary for Home Study of national department of religious education. The Rev. H. H. Bennett, Williamsport, Penn., of the national department of social science, Miss Mary Sanford of Fresno, Cal., girls friendly society, the Rev. Joseph Kwing of Nyssa, who just graduated from the Theological seminary in Virginia and will arrive in Cove June 17 to be captain of the camp during the summer school. The curriculum will include "The Life of Christ," "The Disciples," "Story of Paul," "Life's Problems," "The City of God," "The Mission of the Church," "Hological Drama," "English Church History," "Religious Education in the Home," "The Girls' Friendly Society," "Altar Work," "School Newspaper" and "Church School Handwork." A course in organized play will include "Rhythmic Gymnastics" for girls and "Athletic sports" for boys.

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

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
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
