The wedding of Miss Barbara Constance Dewlaney to Sam Luther Cochran took place this afternoon at one o'clock at the Stanford Memorial church, Palo Alto, California, the Rev. Dr. David Charles Gardner, who since 1902 has been chaplain at the university, being the officiating clergyman. The marriage comes as no surprise in the engagement of the young people was announced last summer by Mrs. Marie F. Dewlaney of Santa Barbara, California.

Both the bride and groom are Stanford graduates. Mrs. Cochran was a transfer from Santa Barbara Junior College to Stanford, receiving her masters degree with the class of 1929. She majored in social science and journalism, and during her university career was very prominent in student activities, holding the office of woman's editor of the Stanford Daily, as well as a number of other positions. She owns a Phi Beta Kappa key and is also a member of the Theta Sigma Phi. During the past year she has been secretary of the division of journalism at Stanford.

Mr. Cochran is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George F. Cochran of this city. He is a graduate of 1929 having completed his work in business administration and journalism in March. His father is also a Stanford alumnus, graduating in law in 1901. He also has been prominent in student activities at the university and is a member of the Sigma Nu Fraternity.

Mr. and Mrs. Cochran will make their home in Sacramento, where Mr. Cochran will be assistant classified advertising manager of the Sacramento Union.
