Among the largest and smallest navy uniforms ever made were those tailored for Karl Dane and George K. Arthur when they began production of "All at Sea," which will be at the Star Theater Friday as their new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer comedy feature.

Dane, towering 6 feet 4 inches tall, was too big for any regulation uniform, and Arthur, less than 5 feet 6 inches high, was too small for any of the issue outfits.

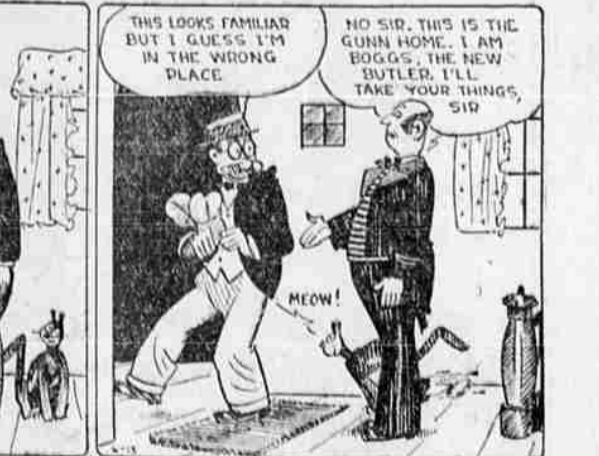

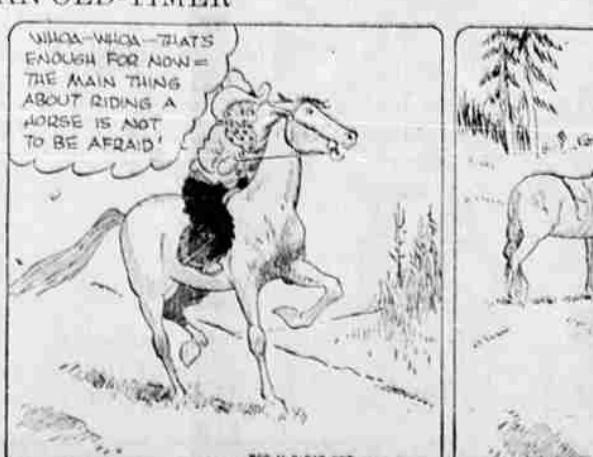
