### MENUS

By SISTER MARY

The hostess who wants something different for her first course for a summer luncheon or dinner will find this in a fruit soup. The clear pool of rich color is most attractive to the eye while the faint fragrance of the fruit tempts the palate.

Tart small fruits and berries are best suited to an acid soup which must above all be piquant and stimulating. Combinations of flavors are pleasing and offer much variety.

Any service which would be correct for either luncheon or a fruit soup can be used. The glass cup or whatever is chosen should be thoroughly chilled before filling with the soup since part of the charm of the soup lies in its temperature. A fruit soup is eaten with a bouillon spoon.

Arrowroot, cornstarch, tapioca or flour are used for thickening. The utmost care must be observed not to make the soup too thick. A firm, sticky confection is far from inviting. The consistency should be syrupy but not jellyed.

Red currants make a delicious soup used alone or in combination with red raspberries. Strawberry and orange is another good combination. When plums are in season they make an appetizing soup.

Sometimes a bit of spice is a help in bringing out the fruit flavor.

Salt is always used to take care of the "flat" taste of whatever thickening agent is used.

Allow about 1/2 cup soup for each person to be served.

### Charity Sisters Shocked At The Dress of Today

EDMONTON, Alta., June 14 (AP)—After years spent in the primitive mission stations of the far north, three members of the Sisters of Charity today were on the way to Montreal, to attend the golden jubilee of the mother general of the grey nuns in Canada.

Sister Houdelet, with a record of 45 years service at the lonely missions of Port Providence and Fort Smith, is returning to Montreal for the first time in 27 years, and after the jubilee celebration in Montreal plans to return north. She is accompanied by Sister St. Cyr, who went to Port Providence 16 years ago, and Sister Garneau, who has been in the north country two years.

Short skirts worn in civilization amazed the sister. When they saw a woman tourist dressed in knickerbockers they were horrified. Said Sister St. Cyr, "The Indians would not like what we have seen in Edmonton."

### Policeman Fails To Stop Suicide

MILWAUKEE, June 14 (AP)—Hundreds of persons watched Policeman Rabeich Pahlke argue yesterday with a man atop a bridge against suicide—and then saw the man leap.

"Let's be sensible," the policeman said to the man on the bridge, Edward Kluge, 56. "Why not talk it over?"

"Never mind, just stay away," said Kluge.

For 20 minutes they argued. In the meantime word had been sent to the fire department. When the fire siren sounded, Kluge shouted: "They won't catch me in any net," and leaped 45 feet to a dry creek bed. He was not killed, but was so badly injured he may not live.
