Butter Extras Drop Half Cent; Berries Hold Up

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14 (AP)—A decline of half a cent in butter extras to 43 1/2 an advance of one cent in medium first eggs to 27 1/2 were the only change in prices today.

The egg storage movement was reported far below what it was at this time last year. Many of the receipts were going to take up this stock.

Foultry, dressed meats, fruit and vegetables were unchanged. Strawberry prices held at Thursday's level. Large supplies received were readily cleaned up. It was not the general belief that prices will go below those prevailing at present.

Wheat Unsettled, Lower At Closing

CHICAGO, June 14 (AP)—Helped by prospective speedy enactment of the farm relief bill, wheat prices today took an early swing upward. Continued reports pointing to lack of adequate moisture in Canada tended also to strengthen wheat values. Opening at 1/4c to 3/4c advance, the wheat market afterward secured additional gains. Corn and oats were likewise firmer, with corn starting 1/4c off to 3/4c up, and subsequently showing a rise all around. Provisions tended downward.

Wheat closed unsettled 3/4c to 1/2c above yesterday's finish. Corn closed quarter to 3/4c up, oats 1/4c to 3/4c 1/2c advance and provisions varying from 5c decline to a rise of 10 cents.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, June 14 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The wool market has continued dull and uncertain, prices are barely steady. There is some demand for medium wools but fine wools very quiet. Buying in the west has slackened and dealers are lowering their bids somewhat."

"The foreign markets are steady. Bradford reports a bit more demand for tops at the week-end, with prices unchanged."

"The goods market appears to be marking time for the moment, at least, there is less business being done than for several weeks."

"Mohair keeps steady on moderate business."

Profit Taking Checks Bullish Trend in Market

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP)—Heavy profit taking impeded the resumption of the upward movement in prices in today's stock market but operators for the rise brought forward new leaders whenever the old favorites showed signs of faltering. After a strong opening followed by a midday wave of selling the market took on the appearance of widespread irregularity by early afternoon but gains still out numbered losses.

Lowering of the call money renewal rate to 7 per cent, coupled with a further easing of time money rates, stimulated pool activities. The market was strengthened in the last hour by another forward movement in U. S. Steel, which mounted over 3 points to above 177.

Michigan Steel rose 5 1/2 points to 100 1/2, and Ludlum 4 points. Cold Duct was also well bought, mounting 4 points. Auburn auto, however, dropped to 28 1/2, after selling as high as 29 1/2 in the morning. Montgomery Ward slumped from 11 1/2 to around 11 on the announcement of increasing the capitalization. The close was steady. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.

Farm Pointers

Do not be too generous with salt when making sauerkraut. Excessive salt is one of the most common causes of failure. The best quantity is 2 1/2 per cent by weight of the packed cabbage if made when the weather is fairly cool.

Spraying will control most of the important fruit tree insect pests, but not borers. To combat these on apples, pears and other pome fruits the grower must resort to worming, which should be done in the spring and fall. For borers in feeding on fruits, especially the peach, paradichlorobenzene is very largely used.

Do not work a slow horse and a fast horse together. This causes loss of power and irritates both driver and horses.

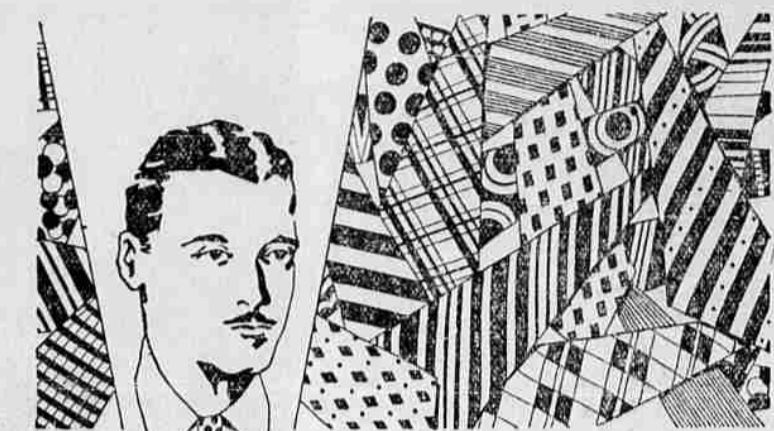
Corn silage for fattening lambs saves hay and grain and reduces the cost of grain. Care should be used in starting lambs on silage. A small quantity should be given at first and the amount gradually increased.

Be sure the silage is of good quality, free from mold and not too sour. Lambs weighing from 50 to 60 pounds should get about 1 1/2 pounds of silage a day in addition to grain and hay. Slightly larger quantities may be fed with proper protein supplement.
