## MENUS

**By SISTER MARY**  
Perhaps there are no two vegetables more popular than tomatoes and cucumbers. All through the year we use them to some extent but during the summer months they become plentiful and cheap.

Tomatoes are actually a tender vegetable and heir to many plant diseases which make them undesirable. Many of the defects are perfectly obvious but some are not so noticeable and must be looked for carefully.

Shape, color, smoothness and firmness must all be considered when shopping for tomatoes. Round or slightly heart-shaped, perfectly formed and not too "perfectly" around the stem—that's the shape to choose.

**Look For Clean Color**  
A good red color is essential. While there are many varieties of tomatoes ranging from a rosy red to a deep scarlet, a definite clear color always should be looked for. A yellowish tinge indicates tomatoes which were picked immature and the vegetable will be tough and tasteless.

Shipped tomatoes usually must be picked in a green but mature stage and ripened by artificial means. These are of generally good quality if the skins are smooth and glossy.

Wrinkled skins are another indication of inferior quality. Firmness should be watched for. Often tomatoes of good color and shape with smooth glossy skins are partly hollow inside and are most disappointing when sliced. Such a vegetable yields easily under pressure and gives a hollow sound when tapped with the fingers.

**Don't Overlook Stem-Rot**  
Stem-rot is easily overlooked because it is almost the same color as the stem-end itself. As this condition spreads rapidly it should be carefully watched. Cucumbers are less perishable and their defects quickly apparent.

Color and shape are the deciding factors. Slicing cucumbers should be two-thirds green in color, long in proportion to diameter and not too tapering towards the ends. Pointed or withered ends, spanginess, yellowing extreme shortness, proclivity to seediness and inferior quality.
