JOHNNY SALO IS MARATHON KING

Son of Finland Wins Cross Country Race to get \$25,000 Prize Money

Sidler (Associated Press Sports Writer) LOS ANGELES, June 17 (AP)—Bronzed of skin, haggard of face and worn to the point of exhaustion, but with the sturdy running heart of a son of Finland, Johnny Salo, 26, today had conquered 3,825 miles of pavement, deserts and mountains, to win the U. S. Pyle luncheon derby and the \$25,000 first prize of the continent-spanning race.

By a margin of but two minutes and 47 seconds Salo triumphed in the grueling grind from New York City. That slim lead he held over Pete Gavuzzi, 115-pound British born Italian, in the total elapsed time standings when the trans-continental event came to an end here last night.

It was in the final hours of the lengthy journey that Salo, a Pasadena, N. J., poleman, blazed his trail to victory. He came from behind to snatch the winner's laurels from the hands of the wily Gavuzzi in the last 20 miles 335 yards of the derby. Gavuzzi made a desperate attempt to head off the flying Finn and in falling lost 15,000 the difference between first and second place money.

The total running times for the two leaders best tell the story. Salo crossed the continent in 527 hours, 57 minutes and 29 seconds. Gavuzzi accomplished the trip in 526 hours and 7 seconds.

More than 12 hours behind Gavuzzi, but in position for third place money—\$6,000—came Giulato Umek, of Italy, who plodded from coast to coast in 533 hours, 46 minutes and 52 seconds. Sam Richman of New York, was next in the elapsed time standings, ready to take the \$2,500 prize for fourth place with a total of 551 hours, 29 minutes and 29 seconds.

A college youth, Paul Simpson of Burlington, N. C., traversed the country in 536 hours 20 minutes and 53 seconds to garner fifth place and \$2,500, the position money. Sixth in line was Phillip Granville, Indian from Amilton, Ont., who walked and jogged to an aggregate of 618 hours, 54 minutes and 22 seconds for \$2,250 of the "pot of gold" at the trans-continental rainbow's end.

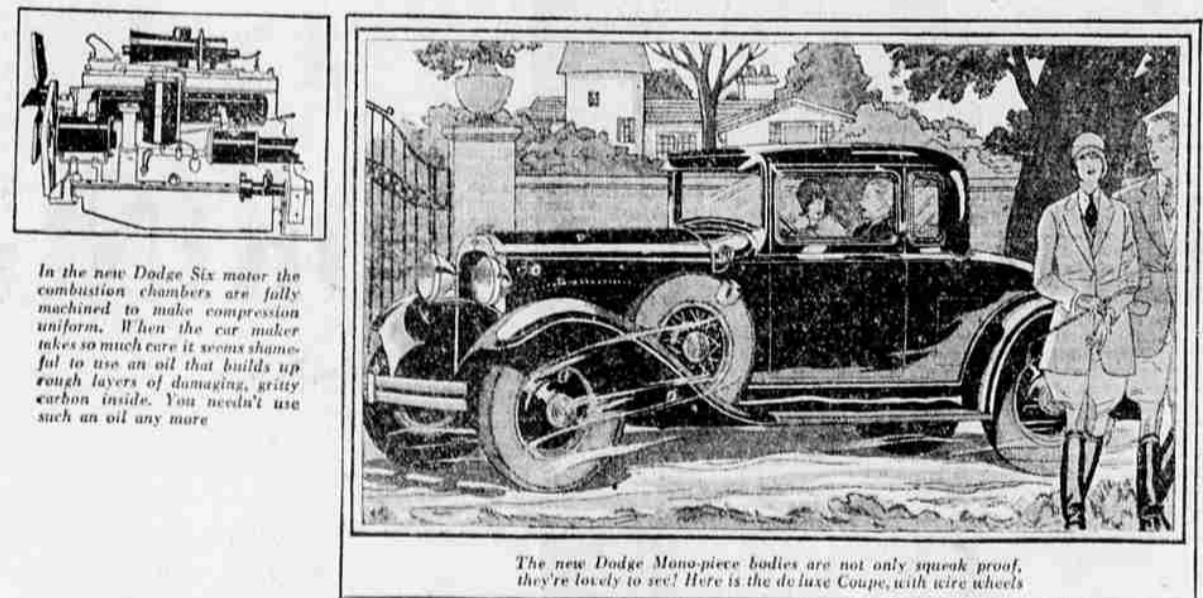
Washington defeated Chicago by 5 to 3 and St. Louis turned back Boston by 5 to 2 in remaining American league fixtures.
