## Beautiful Home Wedding at Hanna Residence Saturday

Both the bride and the bridegroom have been prominent members of their communities and the event is of much interest in La Grande and Walla Walla circles. The nuptials were solemnized at eight o'clock before a beautiful altar of garden roses and rose vine which had been bunched in mass over the large fireplace. Huge baskets of delphinium, roses, pink gladioli, columbine and pyrethrum, were at either side of the altar. Tall pink tapers gleaming from the altar and from a side table illumined softly the lovely background for the ceremony. Baskets and bowls of pink and white garden roses, many of them from the gardens of Walla Walla, Pendleton and Eugene relatives were arranged about the room while huge baskets of lilies in the lavender, yellow and brown shades were used in the adjoining room from which the guests watched the ceremony. 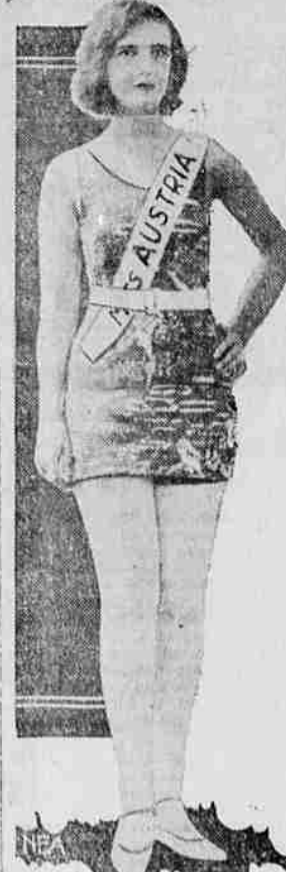
## Young People At Baptist Banquet

such a dish. It contrasts delightfully with lettuce or fruit salad and takes the place of both meat and vegetable.

Meat should not be used more than once a day during the summer months and most housekeepers like to serve it at the evening meal when the whole family is together.

**Tomato Toast with Cheese**  
Four slices of bread, 1/4 cup milk, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tomatoes, cheese, salt and pepper, paprika.

Cut bread in slices about 1/2 inch thick. Beat egg until light with milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Dip each slice of bread in egg mixture and place on a well buttered baking pan. Dot with bits of butter and place one-half of a tomato peeled and cut in two slices on each slice of bread. Dust lightly with salt and cover each slice of tomato with thin slices of cheese. Sprinkle with paprika and bake in a hot oven until the bread is lightly browned and the cheese melted. Serve at once.
