Tuberculosis of chicken, which shows most severely in fowls over one year old, is evidenced by a gradual loss of flesh, the birds or fowl becoming extremely emaciated, with comparatively little flesh on the breast bone, while the head becomes pale and the comb shriveled. In occasional cases lameness is shown, and in advanced cases there is frequently evidence of diarrhea. If the internal organs of such fowls show whitish lumps and lesions, there is little doubt that tuberculosis is present, says the Oregon experiment station.
