Lafferty in Wisconsin— A. W. Lafferty, formerly a resident of the second congressional district, but now an attorney of New York City, is one of the figures in the liquor situation now attracting much attention in Wisconsin. His injection into the situation came by his presentation of a new scheme concerning a move for leaving to the states the power to legislate on medicinal liquor. Local people recall Mr. Lafferty as having opposed John Manning for the office of Oregon senator in 1910, for which he left this state unexpectedly. Mr. Lafferty was at one time a congressman from the second congressional district.

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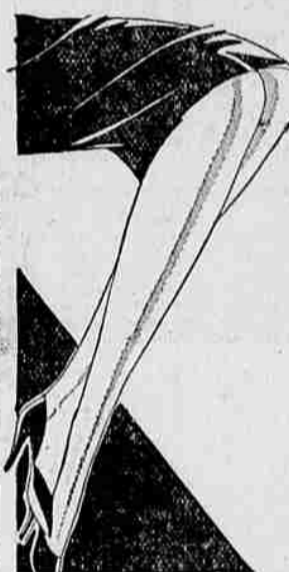
