NEW REGENT MERGER HELD WITHIN LAW

the time for invoking the referendum has elapsed. Even though the emergency clause were constitutional, it would not vitiate the entire act. The precise question which plaintiff urges relative to declaration of an emergency in acts regulating taxation was before this court in the state ex rel vs. Kozer, and was decided adversely to his contention.

Not An "Officer"

“It also was urged that the appointment of members of the board whose terms exceeded four years was in violation of the constitution. It is the view of the court that a member of this board of higher education is not an ‘officer’ within the meaning of the constitutional provision.

“We see no other questions presented which merits attention. “In our opinion, chapter 254, general laws of Oregon for 1929, is not unconstitutional, and the circuit court was right in sustaining a demurrer to the complaint and in dismissing the suit.”

Finding of the regent consolidation action constitutional today means that the Oregon Normal school board of regents, consisting of W. C. Bryant, Moro; George A. Hartman, Pendleton; John H. Fuller, Ashland; E. E. Braag, Salem; Frank J. Miller, Albany; and C. L. Starr, Portland, resigned, will be replaced on July 1, along with regents of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college, by a board of higher education.
