POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 22 (AP)—Columbia and California are favorites for the seventh race over the four mile course of the Hudson river at the 32nd annual renewal of the Inter-collegiate Rowing association regatta Monday. 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**Yale Closes Athletic Year With Sweeping Victory Over Harvard**

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 22 (AP)—By sweeping the annual regatta on the Thames river with his ancient crimson rivals, Yale has closed the athletic year of 1928-29 with an impressive record of 10 to 4.

As the climax to the big blue parade, the 60 oarsmen rowed to three victories yesterday, capturing the classic four-mile variety race by a goal four and a half lengths, to make their contribution to previous Yale triumphs in hockey, basketball, track and baseball. Out of the usual variety, the varied football victory last fall loomed as the biggest achievement, to stand with lesser conquests in tennis and polo.

Out of the 23 races on the Thames since Ed Leader in 1923 took command at New Haven, 18 have resulted in Yale victories. In 1927, Harvard won the freshman and junior variety contests.
