Plans were already afoot today for a monster nationwide demonstration July 6 to President Portes Gil. For having effected the settlement which without destroying the structure of Mexico's revolutionary social laws, will permit the priests to return to their flocks.

The first mass probably will be said at the Shrine of the Virgin Guadalupe, June 29, day of Saint Peter. The Shrine is to the Mexican what Mecca is to the Mohammedan or the Ganges to the Hindu—literally tens of thousands should be on hand for a glimpse of the ceremony before the legendary image of "Our Lady of the Guadalupe." The next service would be in the great Mexico City cathedral.

## CAMPERS MUST SECURE PERMITS

Necessary for Wallowa, Whitman, Umatilla and Malheur Forests.

Camp fire permits are now required on the Wallowa, Whitman, Umatilla and Malheur forests, officials of the Whitman forest announced today.

Any person going into the forest for the purpose of camping, fishing or recreation, who intends to build a fire is required to have in his possession a camp fire permit. The permits can be secured from the following persons: officials in the Baker office, district rangers at Emily, Medical Springs, North Powder, Austin, Halfway and Cove and from firemen located at the various stations in the forest.

The regulation will remain in effect until the fire season closes this fall.

Forestry officials are attempting to induce smokers of cigarettes, pipes and cigars to observe the following code:

"Smoke only while stopping in a safe place clear of all inflammable material, or during or right after a heavy rain, or inside a vehicle on two-way highways, or above timber line. Put out all lighted material."

The code adds that "the law prohibits throwing away any burning matches or tobacco or other lighted material in a forest region."

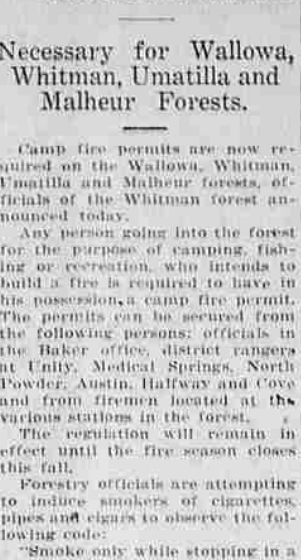
