Numerous inquiries come to the motor association regarding oiling operations in the state and the evident fear of the motorist of oiling operations is very apparent.

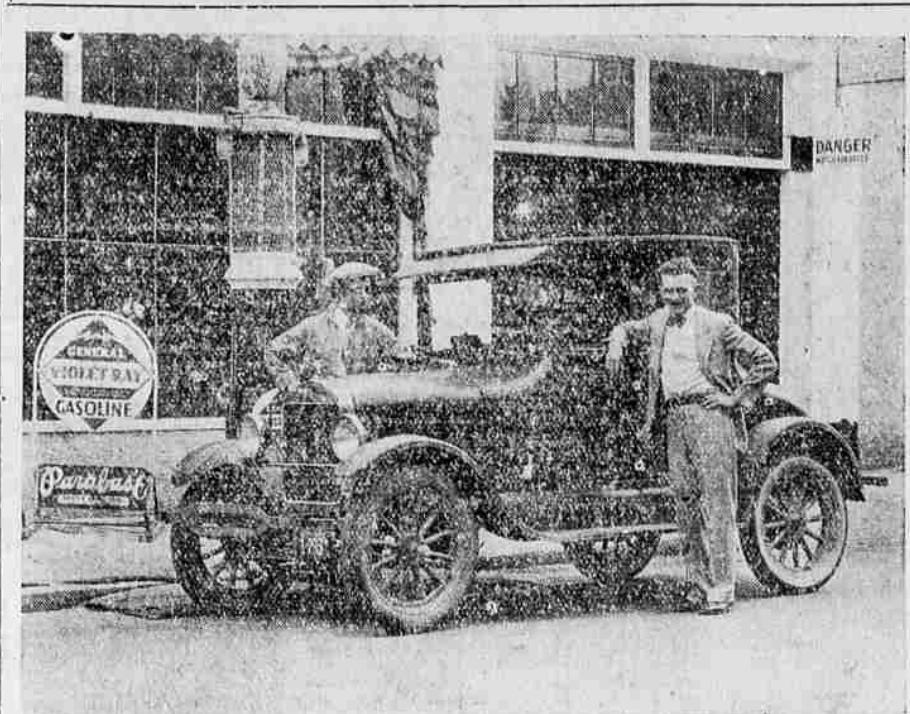
Big Increase In Use Of Forests

Sale Of Cars To Hungry Doubles

WASHINGTON (AP)—Motor car sales to Hungary have virtually doubled for the sixth successive year and American cars now lead in numbers there, William A. Hodgman, commercial attache at Budapest reports to the department of commerce.

The imports from the United States last year were 796, valued at \$64,419. The first direct shipments of American cars to Hungary were made in 1929, when two passenger cars valued at \$3,590 were exported.

In 1929, Italian cars were the most numerous in Hungary, but by the end of 1928 American cars had taken the lead. The sales of American cars there in 1928 constituted 49 per cent of the total.

URGES MOTORIST TO OBSERVE LAW

Obey all Local Driving Practices in Various Communities, is Word.

PORTLAND, June 22—Oregon motorists are warned to obey all local driving practices in the various communities they visit on their vacations in a recent statement issued by the Oregon State Motor association.

Local drivers invariably are outraged when they see a tourist taking advantage of his "foreign" tags and apparently feeling that he deserves special treatment to break traffic regulations as he pleases.

"In many cases," says Dr. McDaniel, "these local drivers who take offense at the tourist's misconduct go and do likewise when they find themselves in a strange city. It is only a small element within the ranks of motor travelers that is disposed to regard itself as above the local traffic regulations, but because its misdeeds are so conspicuous the whole group may gain an unsavory reputation unless the tendency is curbed."

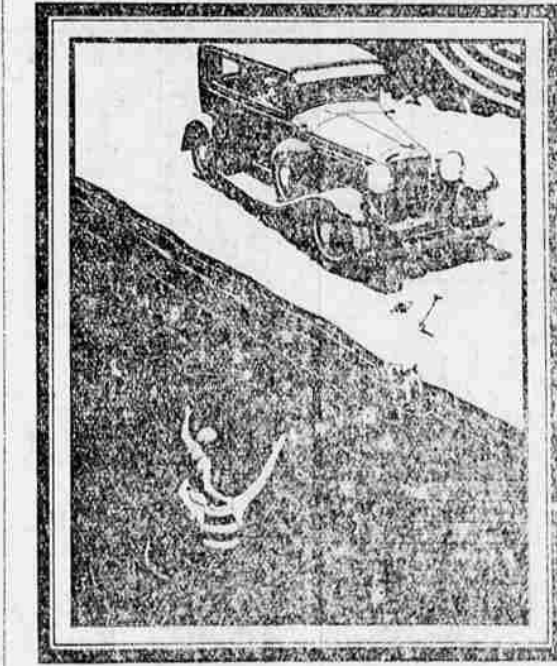
