PORTLAND, Ore., June 26 (AP)—Word was received here from Washington, D. C. that the Herick railroad in Grant and Harney counties has been declared a common carrier by the interstate commerce commission. The line was known as the Oregon and Northwestern railroad.

The line was constructed by and acquired from the Herick Interests by the Edward Hines Western Pine company. It extends fifty miles from Seneca to Burns.

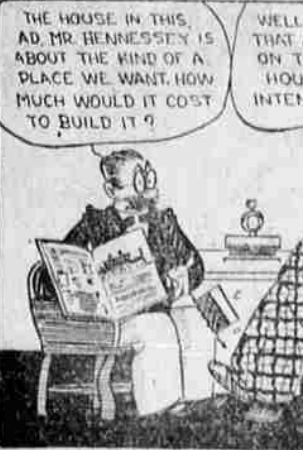
