**Swim Week Tops Mark With 175 Taking Lessons**

Fifty girls under 12 years attended the 2:00 o'clock class for beginners, and 40 boys the 3:00 o'clock class, these constituting the two largest.

Seventeen boys and girls have registered and are working out daily at the various carries, holds, breaks and the resuscitation taught in the junior lifesaving class. Ten are registered in the class in senior lifesaving, which is more advanced than the other, and includes several more tests. Final examinations in life saving are to be held by appointment at any time Saturday, regular classes not being held that day.
