Kaiser's Return Legal Possibility But Not Expected

BERLIN, June 28 (AP)—The return of former Kaiser William to Germany from his place of exile in Doorn today had become a legal, though by no means a likely, possibility.

This development came on the eve of a nationwide observance of the tenth anniversary of the signing of the treaty of Versailles with numerous organized protests against "the war guilty lie."

President Paul von Hindenburg himself headed the signatories to a statement which termed today "a day of mourning" and rejected the Allied contention that Germany alone was responsible for the World war.

By a further coincidence it was the fifteenth anniversary of the assassination of the Austrian Archduke Ferdinand at Sarajevo, the spark that fired the long explosive trail leading to the war.

While the nation was engaged in its protests against "the war guilty lie" it was faced with the new complication of the Reichstag's failure to prolong the present defense of the republic act, one clause of which definitely bars the former Kaiser from German soil.

After riotous voting in the Reichstag last night the government measure in favor of prolongation received 265 voters while 146 were against it. But as a two-third majority was needed the bill failed and the present law will expire on July 22.

There was nothing to show even among the former Kaiser's supporters that he would take advantage of the peculiar situation created by last night's vote.

With the exception of the Rhineland, where an interrelation of the interrelated Rhineland commission interests, there were demonstrations of protest "the war guilty lie" the length and breadth of Germany.

Film Actress Is Fighting Death In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, June 28 (AP)—Gladys Brockwell, film actress, was fighting for her life in a hospital here today as a result of critical injuries sustained last night when an automobile in which she was riding with P. Stanley Brennan, Los Angeles advertising man, overturned near Calabasas, Cal., north of here.

Police Surgeon George Burrell, who attended to Miss Brockwell's injuries, said she had sustained compound fractures of the upper and lower jaws, a fractured skull and other serious injuries. The actress was not expected to live. Brennan suffered broken shoulders and severe cuts on the face and head.

Brennan was driving Miss Brockwell to Ventura, Cal., when the accident occurred. It was believed that the car failed to negotiate the sharp turn in the road and plunged over the embankment, turning over and over as it rolled 57 feet below.

The two were immediately brought here by motorists, who witnessed the accident. Miss Brockwell had not regained consciousness early today while Brennan had not recovered sufficiently to tell just what happened.

Hospital physicians said that should Miss Brockwell recover her face will probably be permanently marred. They said her injuries were such that she is almost certain to suffer facial paralysis.

MENUS

Canning is a comparatively modern art. Until the middle of the nineteenth century, preserving in sugar, drying, pickling, salting and smoking were the common means of preserving food. Fruits as well as vegetables were dried for winter use in pies and puddings. The fruits that were preserved were very rich, for the principle of sealing was unknown and the sugar solution had to be strong enough to preserve the fruit and prevent the growth of bacteria in unsealed jars or crocks.

Today we know that successful canning depends on the principle of sterilization. Food which has been made sterile must be kept so and the efficiency of these processes is the answer to the canning problem.

In addition to the necessity of a temperature which will kill germs and complete sealing to keep out germs, several other factors must be considered in the work of canning.

Canning does not in any way improve the quality of the product. Fruits and vegetables which were old and tasteless before canning will be just that way after canning. Produce which is bruised or spotted has begun to be attacked by bacteria which is not destroyed in the sterilization of canning, so only sound, fresh materials should be canned.

Certain fruits and vegetables are easily canned on account of their acid content. High temperature increases the purifying action of the acid. Strawberries, currants, pineapples and tomatoes and makes it possible to sterilize them easily and quickly. In extremely acid fruits, the acid alone is sufficient preservative without sterilization.

If fruits and vegetables are canned in glass they should be stored in a dark place. Light will cause the foods to lose their color which of course detracts from their appearance when served.

Vegetables which contain no acid are difficult to can. The sterilization or processing period must be prolonged for several hours. The addition of a little acid will overcome this difficulty without affecting the flavor. From one to two teaspoons of lemon juice added to each pint of asparagus, string beans, peas, greens and corn reduces the time of processing and insures against spoilage. Can requires two teaspoons lemon juice. This gives a slightly acid flavor when the jar is opened for serving. However one-eighth teaspoon soda added with the seasoning when the vegetable is reheated neutralizes the acid most satisfactorily.

Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control, finds the Oregon experiment station. Worm injury can be prevented only when the entire surface of every apple and pear is entirely covered with arsenical spray, preferably 2 to 4 pounds of lead arsenate powder to 100 gallons of water.
