## MENUS

**MENUS WOMANS' NIGHT**

Hot days make us think of refreshing drinks for summer afternoons. The tinkle of ice against glass has a cooling effect that we all welcome as the thermometer mounts.

More than this any drink made with fruit has a definite place in the diet. We all realize the importance of eating fruit for its mineral content and vitamins and we should not forget those necessary six glasses of water a day. In a fruit punch we find these essentials combined in a pleasing fashion.

Ginger ale, carbonated water, strong tea infusion or plain water are used to dilute the fruit juice, giving a different flavor and increasing the quantity.

**Flavoring the Punch**  
Ginger ale adds sparkle and pep. Carbonated water gives a tang, while tea distinctly changes the flavor. These all give character to a mild punch where as plain water merely lessens the fruity taste and increases the quantity.

All syrups from canned fruits are good to use in combination with other flavors, although care must be used in adding sugar to avoid over-sweetness.

Whenever it's possible it's well to make the punch and let it ripen. The flavors blend with each other as well as the sugar.

A sugar syrup is preferable to plain sugar for sweetening. Of course this syrup acts as a dilutant as well as a sweetener and must be considered when water is added.

The melting of the ice added for chilling also dilutes the beverage.

Lemon or lime juice gives life to all fruit punches and should always be added if at all possible.

**Prepare for Guests**  
If the housewife will keep bottled fruit juices, ginger ale or carbonated water, it liked, as well as sugar syrup in her refrigerator she can always welcome and refresh the unexpected guest.

Boil one cup sugar and one-half cup water for five minutes to make sugar syrup. From one-fourth to one-half cup syrup will be needed to sweeten punch for four persons.

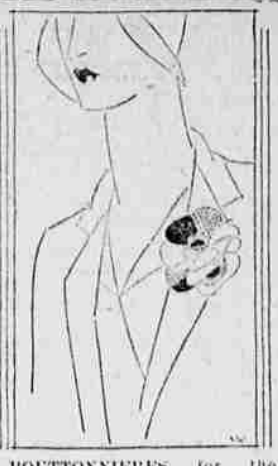
Most fruit drinks must be made "to taste," but the following recipe is a good basic rule and can be varied in many ways.

**Fruit Punch**  
One cup orange juice, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup grape fruit juice, 1 cup ginger ale, 1-3 cup syrup, 1 cup water.

Combine ingredients and chill. Add ice and serve.

Slices of peaches, oranges, bananas or lemons can be added to the punch. Small fruits and berries and sprigs of mint are also satisfactory garnishes.

**Be Kind in Criticism**  
Harsh criticism does not always help to right a wrong, whereas if a few kind words, tactfully mixed with well-meant criticism, is delivered, the results are apt to be quicker and better.—Veranda (Drew) Eagle.
