William Wright Laid To Rest In Cove On Friday

Funeral services for the late William H. Wright were held Friday morning at the Rose Ridge cemetery, the Rev. P. F. Sturges officiating. Mr. Wright was a pioneer of this valley, coming here when a young man in 1864. In the early days he lived in Lower Cove, later taking up a homestead of 160 acres east of the Cove. This place became his home for many years, where he prospered and was known as one of the substantial citizens. He built a good farm house and his farm was planted to fruit, largely prunes. He left this valley about 20 years ago, going to Portland and later to California, returning here three years ago to make his home with his nephew and family, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Duncan. His death came very suddenly from heart failure and he was found dead in the garden where he had been sitting. Mr. Wright was 84 years of age and was born in Indiana. He was twice married and leaves one son, Calvin Wright, of Hillgard, one brother, A. T. Wright, in Portland, his nephew, Ray Duncan, and some other distant relatives, besides a host of friends, who have known him many years.

\$128,000 IS EXPECTED TO BE EXPENDED

The new station will, it is also understood, be two stories and basement, with complete office facilities for the division officials and employees on the second floor, as well as having ample waiting rooms and the usual terminal facilities of the modern railway station. The building will be set so as to allow wide driveway approaches and adequate parking space.

There has been no definite intimation of the type of construction or architecture but the size of the appropriation is sufficient to indicate a beautiful structure that will be a credit to La Grande and the railroad company. It will be thoroughly modern in every respect.

Whether or not the detailed plans have been completed could not be learned today but it is understood from an authoritative source that officials hope to see construction started this summer, probably within the next month, and rapidly rushed to completion.

Announcement of the new station means the realization of one of the fondest dreams of La Grande people, who have considered the old building inadequate and unsightly for many years. The present structure was one of the biggest and finest on the line when it was constructed many years ago. At that time La Grande was a town of only about 2,000 population and subsequent growth has sent the city far ahead of its railroad station.
