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Cardinals Fade Out of Picture In Old League

The situation of the Cardinals is becoming more alarming every day but at the current writing it appears that there is not even a slim chance of their making the American league. The Athletics sinking the Senators at will to maintain their already propitious lead.

The champions of John Heydler's circuit dropped their sixth straight yesterday when the ambitious Pirates won by 5 to 3 at Forbes field. The Cubs held the pace by shading the Reds in Chicago, 5 to 4 in eleven rounds. By way of securing a bit of attention on the American league the Athletics skinned the Senators by 7 to 4 and 4 to 1, gaining half a game on the Yankees who nosed out the Red Sox by 4 to 2 in 18 innings.

12 Lost Out of 14

The defeat of the Cardinals ran Billy Southworth's losing streak to twelve games in the last fourteen. The Pirates annoyed the veteran Clarence Mitchell at intervals for six innings before descending upon him in the seventh for the two runs which provided the ultimate Pittsburgh margin.

The Cubs faltered against the Reds at Wrigley field yesterday, but rallied sharply in the late rounds and pulled out the decision in the eleventh.

By winning, the Cubs remained half a game ahead of the Pirates, and increased their margin over the Giants to four full contests. The New Yorkers took the first game of a double-header at Houston by 5 to 4 as Melvin Ott hit his twenty-third homer, but the Braves claimed the second, 3 to 2. The Phillies and the Hobbes got the afternoon off.

Yanks in Second

The Tigers slugged the Browns by 10 to 4. The Yankees thus climbed back into second place by a narrow margin, although virtually tied with the Browns. The Indians won two extra inning games from the White Sox in Cleveland by 4 to 3 in ten innings and by 5 to 4 in eleven.

COCHET DEFEATS BIG BILL TILDEN

Frenchman Flattens His
Old Rival in Decisive
Fashion Today.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 2 (AP)—Henri Cochet, of France, defeated Bill Tilden in straight sets today in the semi-final of the British tennis championships.

The little French marvel flattened his old rival from the United States in decisive fashion by scores of 6-4, 6-1, 7-5.

The victory was the most one-sided Cochet ever scored over Tilden. Cochet beat him in straight sets in the Davis cup challenge round of last year but on that occasion Tilden won 17 games as compared to the ten he was able to capture today.

Great First Set

Big Bill never threatened after the first set when he lost what seemed a golden opportunity to win the opener by allowing Cochet to pull up from 40-love against him and gain the game that sent him into the lead.

Tilden and Cochet fought a grim first set, games going to four-all with service. Then Tilden missed a wonderful chance. He was leading Cochet at 40-love in the ninth game, but the Frenchman pulled level and won the game, going into the lead at 5-4.

Tilden started the next game with a double fault, the game went to Cochet, and finally the Frenchman broke through the American's service and won the set.

King Watches

King Alfonso, of Spain, arrived as the second set started.

Cochet ran the score to 5-love before Tilden got his only game in the second set. And he captured that only after a long struggle for advantage point. Henri then ran out the set.

Mrs. May Sutton Bundy, winner of the Wimbledon women's singles 24 years ago, was eliminated in the quarter-finals today by Miss Joan Littley, young English player, by scores of 6-2, 6-2.

Plays Courageously

The old tennis campaigner from Santa Monica, Cal., mother of five children, played courageously and well but could not match her youthful opponent in stamina and speed of foot.

A huge gallery thronged into the Wimbledon stands to see in action one of the leading favorites of a generation ago. Mrs. Bundy is the daughter of a former captain in the royal navy and a great favorite here.

Long lines began forming at day-break for the big semi-final and when play began the public stands were packed, with policemen guarding the lines in which were hundreds still seeking admission.

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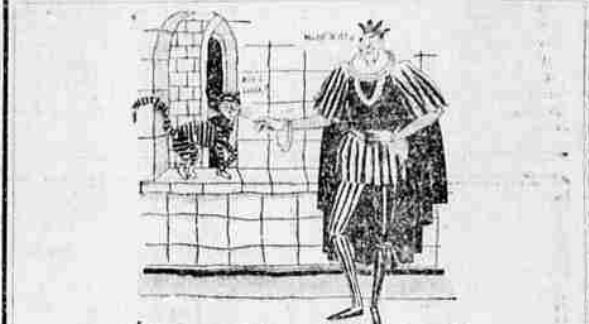
