FRANCE PLANS BIG SHIP TO KEEP UP WITH TIMES

SAINT NAZAIRE, France (AP)—Realization that nine ships larger than any French vessel are being built in other countries has hastened plans for a new French super-line to be launched in 1931. This port, which was visited by more than 1,000,000 Americans during the world war, is experiencing new activity as France pushes plans to accommodate the new ocean palace and make Saint Nazaire one of the great ship-building centers of the world. German labor and technical skill are taking part in the construction to the extent of more than \$3,000,000. This is in the form of reparations payments in kind. In 1929 the colony exported only 206 tons of bananas while in 1927 it produced 8,500 tons.
