San Francisco Seals Leading In Coast League With Four Victories

The San Francisco Seals advanced yesterday a couple of miles ahead of the pack in the Pacific Coast league's fourth of July double headers. The champions of last year's season now lead the league with four victories for the first week of the second half of the season.

Eighteen home runs were pounded out during the day in all eight clashes. The figure sets a record for the season. Three of the seals cranked out three of them, while four of the Seals and Berger of Los Angeles each scored two.

Seals Win Two.
The Seals defeated the Seattle Indians at Recreation park 9 to 5 in the morning fray, and 22 to 10 in the afternoon. Forty-six runs were the total for the day in those two battles alone, causing the fans to marvel at this strange brand of baseball.

The Mission Reds and the Oaks broke even in the double at Emeryville across the bay. The Reds took the morning game 4 to 3 while the Oaklanders copped the afternoon affair 5 to 4 by poaching on Ed Nevers for four runs in the eighth inning.

Los Angeles defeated Portland in the southern camp 13 to 5 in the afternoon. The Angels turned four hits into four runs.

All Tie Game.
Sacramento and Hollywood battled to a standstill in the morning battle at Stockton. The game being called in the tenth inning with a 6-all tie. Frank Shellenbach shut out the Solons in the second battle at Sacramento 3 to 0.

REDS TRIM CUBS IN EIGHT INNINGS

Pirates Take Double header—Leaders Win in the American League.

If the Pirates rose out the Cubs by a margin of one thin game at the end of the National league pennant race on next October 6, the Fourth of July will go down in Chicago baseball annals as a sort of black Thursday. With the course of leadership hanging upon almost every pitched ball, the Bruins entered into an agreement with the Cincinnati Reds to halt the morning game at 12:30 p. m. The Reds won, of course, and the Cubs dropped out of first place as the Pirates swept two more decisions from the crumbling Cardinals.

The Yankees have an unhappy memory of a single game similarly curtailed at the height of the 1924 campaign to enable the champions to keep an exhibition agreement at Indianapolis. The Tigers took that decision by a single run in eight innings, and while the defeat did not stand alone in depriving the Huggins of a fourth straight flag, the fact remains that Washington won by only two games at the finish.

Reds Win By Run
The morning game at Chicago yesterday came to its abrupt close at the end of the eighth with the Reds in front by 5 to 3. It was topped off by a Cincinnati triple play just as it seemed that the Cubs were heading for a certain tie and a possible victory. After the men of Hendricks had taken the lead with a single run in the first half of the eighth, singles by Gonzales and Malone put Cubs on first and third with McMillan coming up. Pittenger seized McMillan's grounder, tagged Malone on the baseline and hurled the ball to Kelly, doubling McMillan. Senior Gonzales, never a gambler, became the third victim as Kelly's quick throw to Gocher met the Chicago catcher at the plate.

A crowd of 18,000 witnessed the morning game in the rain, but 25,000 braved the weather to see the afternoon contest. With Fred Blake's good pitching (after an unsteady first round) backed by hard hitting, the Cubs rewarded their followers with a 10 to 5 victory in the afternoon, but McCarthy's lead of half a game had been crushed under the weight of two Pittsburgh victories.

Pirates Take Two
Henry Meine pitched the Pirates to an 8 to 4 triumph over the Cardinals in the morning and Remy Kenner repeated the performance in the afternoon, 8 to 2. Successive home runs by Comorsky and Sheely, Comorsky's with the bases filled, removed all tension from the afternoon engagement in the seventh, and left the league champions coasting along for a comfortable berth in the second division. The Phillies outpunched the Brooklyn flock by 14 to 12 in a wild first game yesterday, but the home forces rallied behind the curving of Johnny Morrison to romp off with the second by 5 to 3. The Giants completed the National program yesterday by dividing a doubleheader with the Braves whom they had hoped to defeat twice. The Bostoners snatched the opener by 4 to 2 in a ninth round rally, but Larry Benton won the nightcap by 8 to 0.

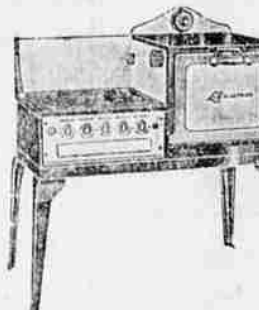
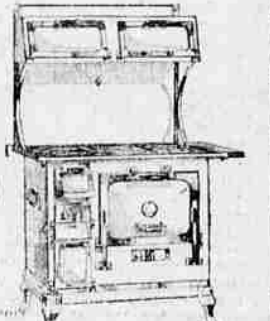

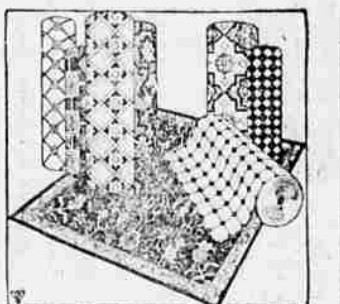

CHICAGO, July 3 (AP)—Leon "Hack" Wilson, the Cubs' policy outfielder, yesterday added two to his list of three squabbles.

After being banished from the field during the afternoon game with Cincinnati for attacking Ray Kops in the Reds' dugout, Wilson sent his first crashing into pitcher Pete Donohue's face when the two teams met at the Union station last night to celebrate for the east.

"You're quite a scrapper, aren't you?" Donohue was reported to have said to Wilson. "If you want any more, come out my way."

Wilson's fist shot out twice and Donohue fell to the floor, striking his head. While the brawl gathered about Donohue and hospitalized him to the foot, the Cubs hustled Wilson aboard the train.

ROSENBLUM WINS MAIN GO IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5 (AP)—Over 2,000 boxing fans witnessed Portland's open air boxing card at Portland baseball park yesterday afternoon. In the main event, Maxie Rosenblum, of New York, gained the unanimous decision of judges and referee over Joe Anderson, Covington, Ky., at the end of their fast and spectacular ten round event. Anderson suffered a bleeding nose in the first round which continued to bleed throughout the battle, but in spite of losing the decision, Anderson gave a good account of himself. Rosenblum's flashing speed and ability to throw boxing gloves from any range or angle aided him greatly in his victory.

Rosenblum had a six and a half pound advantage in weight. Willie Feldman, New York, took an easy ten-round decision over Red Urban, Oakland. They are middleweights.

Ritchie King, Los Angeles, and Matt Calo went six fast rounds to a draw.

Tony Talaresco, Walla Walla heavyweight, and Jack McGreer, Portland, fought a six round draw.
