Price Of Cants Declines Today; Berries Quoted

Wheat Strong And Higher At Closing

PORTLAND, July 5 (AP)—The biggest change in the produce market today was the sudden decline which overtook the price of cantaloupes. When the market opened today, supplies had accumulated and prices had gone down from 7 to 9 cents per cantaloupe. They are being quoted at 43 to 44 per crate of 48.

The price of lemons continued to climb, due to the tremendous quantities shipped east for the July Fourth trade.

Watermelons were quoted at 3 to 3 1/2 cents.

Eggs, butter, poultry and fresh meats held steady over the holiday.

The biggest price spread at the East Side market of the Farmers and Ranchers' association was in strawberries. The best brought \$2 and the poorer quality \$1.65. Other prices were:

CLOSE STRONG TODAY IN WALL STREET TRADE

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—Resumption of vigorous Bull operations after the holidays in today's stock market encountered rather heavy profit taking. But a wide assortment of important industrial and rail were sent into new high territory. The market opened with a heavy accumulation of buying orders, resulting from the sudden breaking of the call money jam on Wednesday, when the rate tumbled from 12 to 6 per cent and the strength of American shares on the London market yesterday. Call money renewed at 7 per cent and although there was some calling of loans early in the session, replacement funds were easily found. Traders were inclined to move cautiously, however, on the theory that the technical position of the market had been weakened by the prolonged upturn.

Stocks which had a big following in the west were among those most heavily bought during the afternoon. National Biscuit at 29 1/2, was up more than ten points to a new high. Kolbar radio rose 6 points, and Standard 5. In addition, DuPont climbed 1 1/2, and General Electric and Chrysler 1 1/2 each. A late express, on the other hand, was down 15 points. The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, July 5 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"There is interest, possibly more interest, in wool, although it is being taken out mostly in inquiry rather than in purchases this week, especially in consequence of the interference of the holiday and inventories. Prices are hardly changed for the week.

"In the west, buying is irregular and chiefly conspicuous in Montana, New Mexico and Oregon, where prices are about on the level of a week ago.

"London looks for five to ten per cent decline at the opening Tuesday. Foreign secondary markets are generally quiet.

"The goods markets show no special signs of new business, but topmakers and spinners report it possible to make continued good deliveries on old contracts at the new price levels.

"Mohair is quiet but steady."
