Great Cross-Country Air Lines Are "Double Tracked," But Rivals

By WILLIAM R. KUHNS NEW YORK (AP)—America's first trans-continental air route will be "double-tracked" from the start, only each track will compete with the other. Two great competing aviation companies, allied with competing railroads under the respective banners of "TAT" or "Lindbergh line," and the "Great Circle line," planned almost simultaneous opening of coast-to-coast services. The benefits of competition, in the opinion of farsighted leaders in both groups, will hasten the development of this new industry. The two lines follow strikingly parallel routes through the south-west, above the old trails, first formed by covered wagons bumping slowly to the coast. With both of regular operation, it may become easier to cross the United States than the isthmus of Panama. The great banks of Wall street have watched the approach of the day when Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle would be only two days from New York. It is an increasingly small minority of banking opinion on the eastern seaboard that does not foresee important financial consequences of this contraction of the continent. The Great Circle line, operated by the University Aid Express, the operating unit of the Universal Aviation corporation which is itself a part of the Aviation corporation of America, began operations June 14. It will cooperate with the New York Central and Santa Fe railroads. The T. A. T., operated by the Transcontinental Air Transport company in cooperation with the Pennsylvania and Santa Fe railroads, has announced the opening of service July 7. The financial community here has become accustomed to the advantages of air mail for swift coast-to-coast delivery of business letters, securities and cancelled checks.
