FIRE DESTROYS HOME AND SHED

Quick Action of Department Prevents Flames From Spreading.

A small house and shed, belonging to Mrs. M. M. Skiggins, who is absent in California, was in part destroyed by fire early last evening. The house, occupied by Robert Cox, according to reports, caught fire about 8:10, the blaze starting apparently between the house and shed. The cause is not known. The fire trucks were rushed to the scene, extinguishing the blaze before it spread to adjacent business and residence buildings, although the fire had a good start when the alarm was sounded.

The interior and exterior of the house was scorched and burned and it was necessary to use a considerable quantity of water to snuff out the flames. The occupants were not at home at the time of the fire and their belongings were ruined.

An estimate of the damage had not been made today, but it is believed that it will amount to several hundred dollars. The house was insured, but only part of the contents were protected.

The house, listed as being at 1427 1/2 Washington avenue, was back near the alley and was near several other wooden buildings. Had the firemen been unable to
