The motor had made no complaint. Neither had the pilots. A call late yesterday for rubbing alcohol, however, gave officials what they thought was a possible answer to the question, but the belief that the men were weakening physically, though their hearts would not allow them to quit, seemed unfounded as day came, to reveal the waving of enthusiastic hands by the pair as they circled the field. If the fliers can stay up just 100 hours, airport officials said. They placed a conservative estimate of the time at 200 hours, in their optimism over prospects of eclipsing the mark of 174 hours 59 seconds.
