Chicago Women
Quarreling Over
Smoking In Club

CHICAGO (AP)—When the Chicago Women's club moved into \$1,150,000 of the very latest in clubhouses, there was an old-fashioned squabble to mark the event and it isn't settled yet.

The battle was between moderns and mid-Victorians over cigarette smoking, with finances giving odds to the moderns.

The moderns somehow got the idea (all wrong, it seems), that the smoking question went out with hatpins, and prevailed upon the house committee to install individual ash trays in the luxurious new clubrooms.

Then Mrs. Howard Kretschmar, a member of 40 years' standing, sauntered in. She was startled by bluish smoke which would have horrified the elite group of Chicago women who founded the club.

"There ought to be one fine club that does not countenance smoking," she said, "and I do not believe the best element in the club approves of the vicious habit. Smoking lowers the tone of the club, for one thing; I hate to see a woman smoke and I'm sure men hate it more."

"But the modern woman smokes," a other member, Mrs. W. P. Grover, rejoined, "and she will go where it is convenient to do so. This club is modern, sort of half-way between an old-time woman's club and an up-to-date sports club."

Mrs. Grover says she does not smoke, thinks it doesn't look nice, but believes each woman has the right to decide for herself.

Whether it is pretty or healthful, the question has an important economic side, which may decide it.

"We have to rent the club to outside organizations to help make up the debt of \$450,000," Mrs. Grover pointed out. "If we ban smoking we will lose this patronage, which we need very much."
