The Reds decisively trounced the Oakland club 9 to 2 across the bay collecting a total of 17 hits. Hollis Thurston was hit hard by the Oaks but the home team wasted most of its thirteen safeties. Oakland used three moundmen. It was Johnny Vergez day, that young fan celebrating his twenty-third birthday. The Oak third sacker was presented with a \$200 watch by admirers.

Never Beats Portland
With timely hitting on the part of his team mates, Ernie Never pitched the Mission Reds to a 7 to 2 victory over the Portland Ducks at Recreation field. After allowing two runs in the first inning, Never settled down and blanketed the visitors for the other eight innings. The Reds reached Fred Oyman for two in the first and piled up a big lead in the middle innings.

Los Angeles humbled the Sacramento Senators in the capital city, 6 to 2, driving Doc Crandall from the mound in the fourth when four runs were scored.

Three Seattle pitchers were the victims of Hollywood swatmen, the Vitton breezing home on the long end of a 12 to 5 score in a lap-sided battle in the home of the Angels.

ATHLETIC LEAD CUT TWO GAMES

White Sox Take Series From Philadelphia While Yanks Score Wins.

Just when it seemed that Connie Mack was headed for open country where even his rear-guard would be safe from any Yankee thrust, the Athletics began absorbing lumps on the chin from the humble White Sox. The champion Yankees resolutely chose the exact moment of Mr. Mack's greatest distress to launch a series of slugs upon the Browns.

The Yanks won three out of four in St. Louis as the Mackies dropped three out of four in Chicago, and by this gesture showed two full games from the Athletics lead in the first series. The Mackies were out front this morning with a margin of seven and one-half games. The Philadelphia host still has a little to worry about, but soon may have plenty unless the Yankee can be applied.

The Yanks had to call on three of their first-string pitchers to guide the Browns by 8 to 7 in the ret-away game at St. Louis yesterday, but Herb Pennock had enough stuff to register a troublesome third out in the ninth and the champions were saved.

Babe Gets Homer No. 18

Babe Ruth provided the Yankee margin yesterday with his eighteenth home run and a triple.

The Athletic reverse at Chicago was brought about by a double failure—the Mackies at bat and Jack Quinn in the box. Urban Feller held the Philadelphia to eight hits to win by 6 to 4.

Washington shamed Detroit by 2 to 1, but the Boston-Cleveland game was called off.

The Pirates gained a bit of breathing space for themselves by dropping the Robins by 2 to 1, at Ebbets field as the Braves dropped the Cubs on the ropes, 6 to 2 for the second time in three games. These two results increased the lead of the Pirates to one and one-half games, but the Giants gave the one-two teams further cause to worry by clinching up their fourth straight against the Reds, 4 to 2.

Long George Kelly celebrated at the Polo grounds with two home runs which accounted for all the Cincinnati scoring. Fred Landrum and Andy Cohen collaborated in driving in seven of the eight Giant runs on three hits between them. Cohen got only one of these, but it was a home run with one on base. Jack Heidricks and six lesser Reds were removed from the premises for talking out loud on the bench.

Two circuit drives by Jim Bottomley enabled the Cardinals to defeat Philadelphia. The score was 7 to 6 in ten innings. Bottomley scored in the second, topped in the final round with \$300 on base after Frank O'Doul had tied the score for the Phils with a drive over the right field wall in the eighth.

Gus Sonnenberg Pins Strangler In Boston Match

BOSTON, July 10 (AP)—Gus Sonnenberg took in another notch today in the diamond champion's belt, after turning back the challenge of Ed "Strangler" Lewis, from whom he wrested the championship six months ago. Twenty-five thousand customers crowded Fenway park and paid \$50,000 to see the second encounter last night.

The former Dartmouth football player suffered the first fall of his eighteen month's mat career last night but came back with the famous flying tackle he borrowed from the grilliron to flatten Lewis twice in 22 minutes.

Lewis successfully avoided Sonnenberg's butting charges at the start. With 15 minutes gone he jumped aside from one of the champion's charges so neatly that Sonnenberg nose-dived to the mat.

The "Strangler" jumped on him and obtained a breast lock for the first fall.

Sonnenberg came back fighting mad but almost lost the match several times when Lewis clamped a headlock on him. Finally, however, he luted successfully to take the second fall in 15 minutes. The deciding fall came three minutes later after Lewis had knocked Sonnenberg out of the ring.

After the match two Chicago sports promoters, Joe Coffey and "Doc" Krone announced that Sonnenberg would defend his title at Chicago in September an opponent to be selected by the Illinois Athletic commission.

Lomski, Walker To Fight In August

PHILADELPHIA, July 10 (AP)—Postponement until August 15 of the round bout between Mickey Walker, world's middle-weight champion, and Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., originally scheduled for July 29 in the Municipal stadium, was announced today by the promoter, Joseph Kennedy.

The postponement was at the request of Walker, who said that he had been unable to go into training as soon as he had planned.

To Investigate Boxing Charges

CHICAGO, July 10 (AP)—Charges that boxers have been forced to give from 10 to 20 per cent of their purses in advance to get places in cards are to be investigated, and promoters and matchmakers have been ordered to appear before the Illinois Athletic commission next Tuesday.

Chairman Paul Prehn yesterday said the commission has evidence of boxers having been forced to submit to the "shake-down" in order to get hours.
