borrow money and so increase his burdens but in enabling the farmers to obtain remunerative prices for their products, and so to have money of their own that they can keep and use.
"The changes made by the pending bill, it is estimated, do not affect 20 per cent of the items subject to duties. The changes made in the non-agricultural schedules are not as numerous or as large as those made in the agricultural items. These are necessary because, since 1922, industrial conditions have changed, new manufactures have entered the markets, and new competitors have entered the field. Industry in its various ramifications, employs many millions of workers; in fact, over 27,000,000 of our people derive their livelihood by being on some one's payroll, who, with their families, comprise more than half our population. They consume the greater part of the farmers' production of \$16,000,000,000. But in order for them to consume they must have employment. An industrial crisis, resulting in a slackening of indus-

try and in unemployment, reacts upon agriculture. Moreover our industrial workers have a right to be considered in tariff making in their own interests.
"I believe the pending tariff bill, which brings the existing law down to date, will result in the continuance and increase of our prosperity."
