

Trouser Skirts Hang On And On—Hopelessly

By Diana Merwin (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP)—Women have not yet seen the last of trouser-skirts. Like the melody that lingered on, they keep asserting themselves when and where least expected. Half the big department stores of Paris have sponsored them in one form or another and at one time or another, each time a new designer takes them up women make note of

it, and then forget all about trouser skirts until they see the next paid. It begins to look hopeless.

A big Rue de la Paix house is the latest sponsor of jupe-culottes. They are showing them there as foundations for house gowns, desirable and evening frocks with lace and chiffon overskirts. A model with black satin trouser foundation, and black lace overdress with long sleeves, is said by its designer to be having quite a success. For every copy of the dress ordered with the original trouser skirt foundation, however, four are ordered with undivided skirt. Many of the most successful recent pajama suits have divided skirts instead of the more usual trousers. Of medium length they have the appearance of narrow skirts when the wearer is not in motion. Other models have trousers with conventionally tight tops and flared legs which simulate ankle long skirts flaring suddenly below the knee.

MENUS

Hot days increase the food problem. The summer heat and humidity is most trying and does much to mar the crispness of foods even if actual spoilage is avoided. Well selected containers go far toward keeping foods in good condition. Covered glass or earthenware dishes are excellent for storing food, both raw and cooked. Soft fruits like berries keep in better shape if they are taken immediately from the box in which they are marketed and spread on a platter or plate. Keep them in a cool place but not in the refrigerator unless a cool cellar is not available. Whenever fresh fruits or vegetables are kept in a refrigerator they should be stored in the warmest place. Use Left-Overs Promptly The care of left-overs requires special attention at this season of the year. In the first place, buy as little as possible and thus do away with the possibility of left-overs. Make it a custom to use all left-overs promptly. Cooked vegetables that have been dressed simply with butter can be used in a vegetable salad or reheated in a cream sauce. This changes the dish enough to make it acceptable at the next meal. Vegetables or meats that have been prepared in a cream sauce will spoil very quickly. They should be placed in one of the coldest parts of the refrigerator and used within 24 hours. Bread and bread crumbs require extra care during the summer months. Bread molds quickly and to overcome this tendency it's a good plan to seal and sun the bread container once or twice a week. It's not wise to try to keep buttered toast more than a day. The butter soon becomes rancid and the toast is ruined for crumbing. Buy Small Quantities Bread crumbs which have been dried in the oven soon become rancid if stored in an air-tight container. Put them in a glass jar and stretch double thickness of cheesecloth over the top. Hold the cloth in place with a rubber band. It seems wisest to buy flours and cereals in small quantities while the weather is hot. The cereals lose their crispness and the flours are apt to become infested with flour weevils. A two weeks' supply is sufficient. Ready-to-serve cereals and crackers can be crisped if placed in a warm oven for 20 minutes. They must be thoroughly cooled before serving. Careful planning and calculation will do much to eliminate waste and makes for economical housekeeping. A new harbor for large vessels is to be constructed at Boulogne-sur-Mer, France.
