MENUS

By Sister Mary
During the summer the intelligent choice of foods will do much toward keeping one cool and comfortable. The heat and tendency to physical inactivity make the energy requirements of the body less than during cold weather, so the caloric consumption of the winter months should be reduced. However it is vastly important to eat nourishing foods which will regulate the functions of the body and guard against the annoying digestive troubles characteristic of the hot weather.

The stomach is as sensitive to the heat as any part of the human organism, and overloading or overtaxing in any way this organ may cause much discomfort.

Some Foods to Avoid
There are certain types of foods to avoid during excessive heat. Rich sauces and gravies, fried food, heavy potatoes, rich cakes and desserts, hot breads and sweets all have a decided heating effect on the body. All fats are heat producers and some are difficult to digest as well.

The foods to eat are fresh fruits and vegetables, meat or its substitute not often than once a day and plenty of milk and water.

Fresh fruits and vegetables are refreshing and cooling and furnish the body with the essential constituents for maintaining health—namely vitamins and mineral salts.

Protein is always necessary to take care of the wear and tear of the body, but since proteins increase energy production in the system it is advisable to eat only as much protein food as is actually needed.

Liquids for Summer-Time
Plenty of liquids are needed at all times of the year. But as heat causes more rapid evaporation from the surface of the body, more milk and water and fruit juices are necessary in warm weather. Keep in mind that cool beverages, when drunk rapidly, may cause discomfort by the sudden chilling of the stomach. Slowly sipping very cold drinks and slowly eating ice is the safest method—and most effective, too, since it brings a more lasting coolness.

Plenty of roughage is necessary for summer as in winter. This is found in fruits and vegetables.

Three well-balanced meals with fruits, vegetables, milk and water predominating and a minimum of meat will do much toward making even very hot weather endurable.

PARIS (AP)—More black and white in the form of minute polka dots and small figured prints has blossomed forth here as a late summer fancy.

Printed voiles, georgette crepes and crepe de China are just as popular as black satin, picked by some of the prophets earlier in the blossomed forth here as a late summer costume.

The polka dots and small patterned prints are part of the revival of calico prints in old-fashioned designs adapted to silk. Many of the print costumes appear on fine days at the races in the form of short coated silk suits. Some of the smartest of them have Eton collars and cuffs and nearly all are as simple in effect as school girl costumes.

Polka dots are not all limited to the simple costume. One of the richest silks for evening is the gold and silver polka dotted tullest several big dressmakers use for wraps and formal dresses.

So far the revival of black-hose for wear with summertime black and white costumes is limited almost entirely to chic French women. Black gloves, however, have many partisans among Americans and are more and more seen.

CROWD VIEWS GRIM TRAGEDY UNKNOWNLY

hands indicated the part he had taken in the attempt to rescue the boys and that never in his experience had he seen such a tragedy. "In the glare of the blaze," he said, "I saw boys and men leaping from the roof. They fell 40 feet, their clothes blazing and illuminating them as they came. We could do nothing—to approach the building was to risk death. All we could do was to rush close to the flames and drag away the boys who had jumped."

Arthur Stewart was one of the few spectators who realized what was happening, and that it was not part of the program. He said he could never forget the scene. "One moment there were laughing boys peering over the edge of a concrete structure playing in part of the structure. Laughing men and women stood around and watched the fun. Then with terrible suddenness comedy turned to tragedy."

SECOND TRAGEDY

LONDON, July 12 (AP)—While the dummy houses fire horror was taking place last night at Gillingham, there was a tragedy of fire in another nearby Kentish town at 10.

At Welling, only a few miles away, a cinema theatre caught fire from the operator's box and two were burned to death and several injured.

The audience was panic stricken but all managed to escape. The operator and his assistant perished.

West Coast Air Corporation Is To Operate Line

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—Merger of the West Coast Air Transport company and the Western Air Express today had resulted in the formation of a new organization to be known as the West Coast Air Transport Corporation of Delaware.

The announcement of the acquisition of the assets of the West Coast company by a group headed by James A. Talbot, chairman of the board of directors of the Richfield Oil company of California, and Harris M. Hanshue, president of the West Express, was made late yesterday.

Mr. Hanshue, who is also president of the Fokker Aircraft corporation, airplane manufacturer, will head the new corporation, with Mr. Talbot and Bradford M. Melvin, vice presidents, and R. W. McKee, secretary-treasurer. Head offices of the firm will be located here.

A daily airplane passenger service between Los Angeles and Seattle will result from the combination, the Western Air Express operating planes between here and San Francisco, and the West Coast line running ships between there and Seattle.
