STORM CAUSE OF 8 DEATHS IN MISSOURI—MOSELLE, Mo., July 15 (AP)—Marie Beckman, 28, her four children, ages 15 months to seven years, her mother and her brother were drowned in Pinoak creek, southwest of here yesterday when a stream of water from a cloud-burst overturned an automobile and swept them to their deaths. An eighth person was a victim of the storm at Desoto, Mo., 15 miles from here, when he was struck by lightning while playing ball.

The dead:—Mrs. Marie Beckman, 28 of Walnut Park, St. Louis county; Mrs. Mary Tigges, 31, mother of Mrs. Beckman; Lawrence Tigges, 15, brother of Mrs. Beckman; Virgil Beckman, 7; Marie Beckman, 5; Irene Beckman, 2; Bernice Beckman, 15-months; and Clarence Stahl, 15, of Desoto.

William F. Beckman, husband and father, was the only survivor of the family outing yesterday and he owed his life to the fact he had gone for assistance to get the automobile started when the swirling torrent poured down on the hapless group.

FIRE LOSS—back—NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., July 15 (AP)—Weekend fires aggregated total losses amounting to nearly \$1,750,000. Provincial exposition buildings at Queens Park were destroyed Sunday with a loss of \$450,000. Only the stadium and a few stock buildings escaped. Saturday the Westminster Paper Company, Ltd. plant was destroyed with a loss of one million dollars. The fire spread to a portion of the Triangle Chemical company, causing a quarter million dollar loss.

FIGHTING BRUSH FIRE—REDLANDS, Cal., July 15 (AP)—A brush fire which swept over 2,000 acres of land northeast of Beaumont, Cal., near here, late yesterday was being fought by a force of over 500 men early today in an effort to keep the flames from spreading into the San Bernardino national forest. The fire broke out in Cherry Creek valley at noon yesterday. United States rangers and fire fighters from Riverside and San Bernardino counties joined the blaze under control this morning.

Pope Pius Honors American Fliers—VATICAN CITY, July 15 (AP)—Pope Pius has paid the American trans-Atlantic aviators, Captain Lewis A. Yancey and Roger Q. Williams, an unusual honor. They were granted a private audience yesterday. As they entered the Pontiff arose and walked across the room to meet them. He said in English: "Welcome, welcome."

Record Attempt Ends In Failure—WICHITA, Kas., July 15 (AP)—Forced down by a leaking oil line, Lieut. Herbert J. Fahy, failed yesterday in his attempt to break the trans-continental round trip one-stop flight record. Fahy, who left Los Angeles at 12:00:52 a. m. yesterday landed at Klowa, Kas., at 8:45 a. m.

ROBBED OF \$15,000—HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 15 (AP)—M. Crowley, a bank messenger, was held up and robbed of approximately \$15,000 by three men who accosted him on Hollywood boulevard today. The messenger resisted the trio and captured one of the men, Lawrence McMillen, 27, a pedestrian, James Thorpe, 23, year old Mormon missionary, was slightly wounded in an exchange of shots between the robbers and Crowley.

safely at Villacoublay, France a few miles south of Versailles. "Don't ever hope we just miss out, that's all!" It's pilot, Captain DeLionne Coste, conqueror of the South Atlantic, told the few who met him there. "But we will try again, when the chances are more in our favor."

Captain Coste's landing came after 27 hours and 55 minutes of flying after the takeoff at Le Bourget at daybreak Saturday, when he simultaneously allowed the slower Polish plane a 45-minute handicap in the transatlantic race. At the time of landing back he had flown a time of twenty-four hours and 45 minutes northeast of the Azores about 30 miles from the Atlantic seaboard as to Europe.
