U. S. STEEL TO RETIRE BONDS DUE IN 1963

NEW YORK, July 16, (AP)—Directors of the United States Steel corporation today voted to retire the ten to sixty years 5 per cent bonds of 1923 at 110 and accrued interest. There are \$132,372,000 principal amount of these bonds outstanding.

The directors passed a resolution calling the bonds for redemption November 1. The major part of the fifty year 5 per cent bonds of 1921 have also been called.

COMMITTEE SUICIDE—MARIETTEFIELD, Ore., July 16, (AP)—J. E. Fitzgerald, 65, shot himself to death early today at his home. Four years ago he had a fractured skull in a fall off the roof of his barn and had been dependent since that time. SAN FRANCISCO, July 16, (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, speaking for the transcontinental air transport company and the Maddux Air Lines, Inc., today announced a daily transcontinental air service would be inaugurated September 1 between this city and New York.

Colonel Lindbergh, who said he would take off early this afternoon from Mills field here for Los Angeles, said the contemplated line would give San Francisco and the east by a two day air-rail schedule to the east.

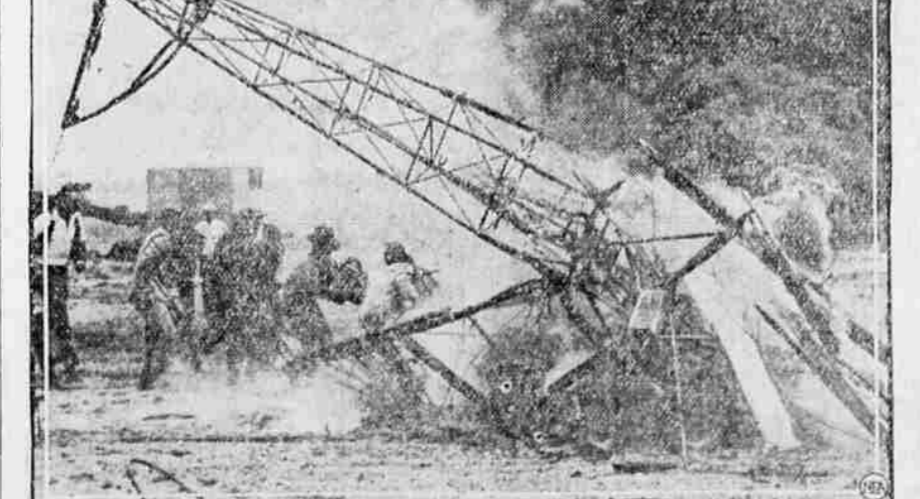


The body with the perfect back is Jeanette Loff, Pathe featured player. She is the first graduate of the company's school for young players.

Camera Catches Rescue From Blazing Plane



This remarkable picture of an actual rescue from the blazing wreckage of an airplane shows how Henry R. Goldsbach, Freeport, Long Island, student diver was frantically hurled from the flames that also killed Francis Phillips, wealthy son of the late John M. Phillips, "copper pipe king" of New York. Goldsbach was thrown from the tiny biplane when it crashed and caught fire at Roosevelt Field, but landed in the wreckage and died later from burns received. Phillips, who was piloting the craft, was trapped by the flames and could not be reached by rescuers.
