Farm Pointers

When lambs are to be kept on the farm, the best method of weaning them is to leave them on the old pasture for three or four days and remove the ewes to a scanty pasture, to check the milk flow. As soon as the lambs quit suckling for their dams, they may be moved to fresh pasture where the ewes have not been. Ewes with large udders should be milked once every three days until they go dry.

If the dairy cow kicks when being broken to milk handle her carefully—she will not form the habit. To strike her only makes matters worse. Before starting to milk put a rope or strap around one hind leg, cross it between the legs and then put it around the other, drawing them close together. Put the rope above the hocks and cross it in the middle, otherwise it will slip down when the cow struggles.

Lip reading is a crucial factor in the education of the hard-of-hearing; without it their education is weakened; with it their education is strengthened. It serves as a substitute to round out their upbringing. It serves both as a profit and as a reserve fund.

There is a defect in the public school systems when individuals for whom they were created are not permitted and not equipped to share to the full extent in their curricula and activities. Thus the progress in the education of the hard-of-hearing child is hindered because of lack of approved medical care, correct hearing tests, and the absence of lip reading teachers.

Lip reading is the fairy wand in the education of the hard-of-hearing; it is one of the happiest amenities in the life of these people, for it is a compelling influence to help one's self and in so doing to help one's neighbors. Lip reading should be regarded, and rightly so, as a necessity, for its effect is cumulative, leading the hard-of-hearing into new fields, beyond the urgent wants of every-day life.

Omitted in the education of the hard-of-hearing child is hindered because of lack of approved medical care, correct hearing tests, and the absence of lip reading teachers. Lip reading means a reduced output in life's endeavors.

Probably one reason the "re-views" do not flourish in the summer time is because they have so much opposition from the bathing beaches. In it proper to speak of a woman's chest? Not that we have any desire to, but in case we should have occasion sometime to do so we'd like to know. . . .

Time, skillful thought, sustained effort, pride and skill in one's work, the love of service, good cheer, fair health and the sacrifice called duty are valuable assets for the teachers of lip reading. The education of the hard-of-hearing without lip reading means a spoon-fed training and it means a throttling influence impeding the rightful up-bring of the child.

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
