### FOODS GOOD FOR CLEAR SKIN

Physician Recommends Three Vegetables to Improve Complexion

### Ken Doherty's Decathlon Ability Brings Delight to U. S. Track Fans

NEW YORK (AP)—One of the most phenomenal athletic achievements in years is the rapid ascendancy of Kenneth Doherty, slim, 23-year-old Detroit youth, to the peak of all-around prowess.

There seemed a yawning gap to fill when bespectacled Harold Osborn, the Illinois schoolmaster, was forced from the heavy work of track and field competition but less than two years Doherty not only has equaled Osborn's record of winning the national decathlon championship twice in a row but also established a new American record for the ten-event racket.

Four definite mile-marks indicate the astonishing rapidity with which Doherty has climbed to the top. They are:

1. Second to Tony Plankly in the Penn relay decathlon, April, 1928, with a total of 7041.339 points.
2. Winner of Olympic tryout and national championship at Phil,adelphia, July, 1928, with 7869.52 points.
3. Third in Olympic championship at Amsterdam, August, 1928, with 7766.659 points, helping to force Paavo Yrjola of Finland to new world's record of 8656.20 points to win.
4. Winner of national championship for second time at Denver, July, 1929, with 7734.95 points, a new American record.

Until he went to the College of the City of Detroit, Doherty started no one with his athletic ability.

It was the eye of D. L. Holmes, the college track coach, who had no thought whatever of engaging in any particular competition, much less the decathlon, the hardest of them all. It was the case of a "hunch" on the part of Holmes. In Doherty's slinky frame and cool disposition, Holmes noted decathlon possibilities.

"Ken is a great competitor," said

Holmes. "Notice the way he gets in his best jump or performance when he is pressed. That remark was made at the Penn relays in 1925. Even Holmes then did not realize what a prize he had uncovered.

Doherty is not flashy but wins by his remarkable consistency. His best events probably are the broad and high jump, pole vault, discus and javelin, but he never is far down the list in the others making up the decathlon. He seldom wins more than one or two firsts but is a strong finisher.

Doherty seems to take delight in making the trackside life the best. Last year Pat Eklins, the Nebraska Indian, was picked an American's best decathlete but he broke down at the start of the final trials, which Doherty won.

Recently, at Denver, Doherty not only displayed Eklins' former American record but outlasted the newest Indian all-around star, Wilson Charles of Haskell. Twice this year the youthful Charles has set a world's record pace in the first half of the decathlon test only to find out that the last five events are the hardest.

### Loughran Ready For Challenger Tomorrow Night

NEW YORK, July 17, (AP)—Tommy Loughran, best of all the fight champions, will defend his light heavyweight crown against James J. Braddock of Jersey City, at the Yankee stadium tomorrow night in what may prove to be his last fight as a 175-pounder.

Winner or loser in his battle with "Jersey Jimmy," Loughran is authority for the statement that he will engage in few if any more bouts as a light heavyweight.
