BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 17 (AP)—A raging fire in an oil well at Mireni has defied the efforts of workmen and firemen to extinguish it for 42 days. Two men were burned to death last Saturday in an attempt to choke the well. The fire was believed to be the greatest ever reported in any oil field in the world, and the damage so far is put at \$1,000,000.

Day's "Maximum" Living Program. Also Longevity by Theodore R. Appel, M. D., Secretary of Health Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. In this day and age more people are interested in how to live longer than they are in how to live longer. The fascination of every-day life tends to focus the general attention upon today's activities and pleasures rather than upon a consideration of the effect on the length of life that one's habits and customs are likely to develop.

While this attitude is a most natural one, it would nevertheless pay many thousands of people to stop and consider whether or not their present mode of daily existence is as a matter of fact, offering them a maximum of pleasure and at the same time insuring them the abounding health and vitality that are really necessary to get the most out of each day for the greatest number of possible days.

Life is decidedly more than a daily proposition. It is an experience in which the individual usually has the say as to whether or not it is to be lived briefly or lengthily, healthily, or otherwise, wise, half-heartedly or with vigor. Health departments and other public health organizations can, and are, protecting the public against epidemics, bad water, impure milk and against many other factors that directly affect humanity in the mass. On the other hand, the individual is required to do his part intelligently and interestedly if the labors of the official organizations are to be of greatest benefit.

To live is a worthy ambition. However, to live zestfully and for a long time should be the aim of everyone. Therefore, do not permit the glamour of the day's activities so to distort the judgment that ill health or semi-invalidity results. Such a life is a failure, no matter what its achievements may be. Any average twenty-four hour day's life that does not include eight hours sleep in a well ventilated room, exercise in the open air, a fair share of work and recreation, a proper amount of but not too much food, a sensible use, if used at all, of stimulants, and a consciousness of the necessity of attaining and maintaining health—such a day is a lost and personally damaging one.

Live by all means but live daily at your best, for as long a time as you can. It is your job and your responsibility. Moreover, it is the real secret of a successful and happy life.

and keeps it in the icebox until wanted. A frozen salad can be left almost indefinitely in the drawer of an electric refrigerator or can be kept in ice and salt for five or six hours. The lettuce can be washed and kept in an air-tight container until wanted. If these things are done in the morning the actual work at dinner time is merely a matter of serving.

Jellied salads usually require at least two hours to become firm and may be kept on ice for 24 hours without detriment to the salad.

One precaution should be kept in mind. Extra gelatine is necessary during hot weather and when fruit is included among the ingredients if the jellied salad is to be appetizingly firm.

The following salad can be varied in several ways and features the surprise element which is always popular:

## Stuffed Jellied Salad.

Two tablespoons granulated gelatin, 1/2 cup cold water, 1 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1-1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 package cream cheese, 4 tablespoons finely chopped nuts, 4 tablespoons minced celery, 4 tablespoons whipping cream, 2 peaches, lettuce, French dressing.

Soften gelatine in cold water. Add boiling water and when dissolved add sugar, lemon juice and salt. Pour into individual molds and cut a slice from top of each. Remove centers and fill with cream cheese moistened with whipping cream and combined with nuts and celery. Place each mold in a wreath of sliced peaches arranged on lettuce. Replace slice removed from top very carefully and serve with French dressing.

A thick slice of apple or pineapple could be used in place of sliced peaches. Pine large tomatoes cut in thick slices also might be used and would supply an attractive touch of color.
