Modification then would not be necessary.
Governor George Dern, Utah: "The suggestion of division of authority sounds logical. It will be of great aid in doing away with the passing of the law enforcement buck. In my opinion there never will be modification in Utah."
Governor Richards, South Carolina: "In my opinion modification is necessary, but it will never take place in my state."
Governor Caulfield, Missouri: "Interesting, constructive."
Governor Covey, West Virginia: "We enforce all the laws in West Virginia, and so far as we are concerned we don't need modification of the prohibition law in our state."
Governor Trumbull, Connecticut: "We are intent on enforcing our own laws in our own way in our own state."
Governor Shafer, North Dakota: "Mr. Wickorsham's suggestion that the states and federal government adopt a co-operative program of prohibition enforcement to displace the program of duplication of effort is a good one, not only from the standpoint of the practicability of the idea but also from the standpoint of duty."
