### Catholics End Convention In Salem At Noon

SALEM, Ore., July 18. (AP)—With the reelection of Willibald Eibner, New Ulm, Minn., as president for another year, and the election of other officers, the 73rd annual convention of the Catholic Central society of America, closed its business sessions yesterday not to be reopened until the Diamond jubilee convention in Baltimore in 1930.

The National Catholic women's union also closed its convention at noon after a three hour session of final committee and officers' reports. Mrs. Sophia C. Waverling, Quincy, Ill., national president, and other officers of the women's union were elected at the convention at St. Cloud, Minn., last year to serve for a two-year period.

Resolutions against the high cost of hospital care, resolutions of protest that the special session of congress should have attempted to legislate on the "tariff while considering so important a measure as the farm relief bill," a resolution opposing the national origins clause to the new immigration law, a resolution opposing federal control of education and endorsing Secretary Wilbur's opposition to a department of education, resolutions advocating world peace, the work of the Catholic truth society of Oregon, charity, Catholic education, the Catholic youth movement, the Papal college and credit unions in the organization, were passed at the convention.
