Blacks Kill Lions With Spears in "Simba"

The most thrilling moment in "Simba," the big game hunting motion picture made in Africa by Mr. and Mrs. Martin Johnson, which is now playing at the Star theatre, is that which shows the naked blacks of the Lamboya tribe, armed only with spears and shields, attacking and killing full grown lions. It seems incredible that the king of beasts could be slain by such simple weapons, but the camera shows exactly how it is done, and the scene keeps spectators on the edges of their seats. As Martin Johnson, who photographed the battle, tells it, he, with his wife, Osa, and their assistant, had trekked down into Tanganyika on the trail of lions. This says Johnson, is the most wonderful big game tract in the world. "Not long after we entered Tanganyika," he says, "we met forty naked Lamboya warriors in war paint on their faces. Their native hunters were armed with long spears and shields of buffalo hide. Each man had decorated himself and his shield with his own idea of war paint. The blacks had spent days in working themselves into a fever of courage which would nerve them to face 'simba' in his own haunts. Considering their inadequate weapons, I think they needed a lot of courage."

Beware of Poison Oak

Vacationists, campers, and hikers through the Oregon woods are warned against the danger that lurks in the Rhus radicans or diversiloba or "poison oak." The plant the leaves of which appear in clusters of three may well give pause to all those who are tramping in the country. It is worth while for every out-of-doors person to know how to recognize this plant so that he may be able to distinguish between vegetation that is friendly and those plants and vines and other growing things that should be avoided.

Poison oak is one of the worst offenders, as the growth of this creeping, clinging and climbing vine is particularly abundant. But you can avoid it if you will remember that poison oak is readily distinguishable from other vines by its three leaflets. The plant is a shrub which grows wild in this state. It may lay prostrate upon the ground, though it will climb shrubbery or trees in sunny locations. It may grow erect with a self-supporting stem. The leaves have a peculiar satiny appearance. The flowers are greenish yellow and are followed by small, drupeaceous pale green smooth fruits borne in loose bunches.

The dermatitic-skin poisoning that is caused by poison oak which is not an oak at all, is due to an irritative resinous substance in the sap of the plants. Some of the conditions under which poisoning can occur from this plant are as follows:

There is the widest difference in susceptibility. A different individual, some being apparently incapable of being poisoned by it, while others who have been exposed to it frequently for years without result may suddenly become seriously poisoned. Others, again, are extremely sensitive to its action, the most serious results ensuing even from moderate contact. The mere presence of this on one tramp into the country

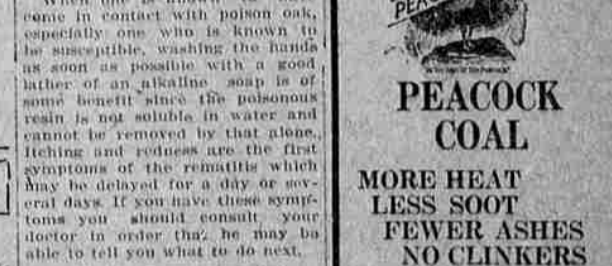

When one is known to have come in contact with poison oak, especially one who is known to be susceptible, washing the hands as soon as possible with a good lather of an alkaline soap is of some benefit since the poisonous resin is not soluble in water and cannot be removed by that alone. Itching and redness are the first symptoms of the dermatitis which may be delayed for a day or several days. If you have these symptoms you should consult your doctor in order that he may be able to tell you what to do next.

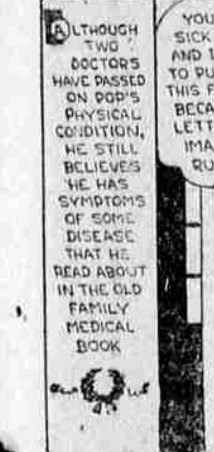
