

CANADIAN RAINS WEAKEN PRICES

Chicago Wheat Market Quotations Drop Due to Scattered Showers.

CHICAGO, July 19 (AP)—A light rain falling in the Canadian northwest and in South Dakota weakened the grain markets today and with a lull in buying, prices declined. Wheat had opened unchanged from yesterday's flush to 1 1/2% higher, but the current turned within the opening hour and at 10:30 o'clock wheat was 3/4 to 1 1/2% lower than Thursday's close. December delivery sold at \$1.30 1/2, September at \$1.44 1/2, and July at \$1.39 1/2.

Temperatures from 50 to 102 degrees were prevalent over the prairie provinces yesterday and the forecast was for fair and warmer today but a streak of hope was extended in the prediction of scattered thunder showers. Rain fell today at Edmonton, Price Albert and Pierre, S. D., but the extent of relief to the drought afflicted spring wheat crop was as yet unknown.

The Liverpool market was steadied for a time by buying influenced by unfavorable reports from Australia, but declined later in sympathy with the North American markets and was 1 1/2% to 2% off at the close.

Corn was 1 to 1 1/2 cents lower in the early trading here.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19 (AP)—Brisk trading and wide variety of offerings marked today's session of the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association. A number of new seasonable products made their appearance at comparatively reasonable prices. Among the latter were green apples, green peppers and egg plant. In the price changes, currants, pie cherries and squash were up, while turnips, ling cherries and cabbage were slightly lower. White corn was 10 cents cheaper as yellow bantam began to arrive in quantities.

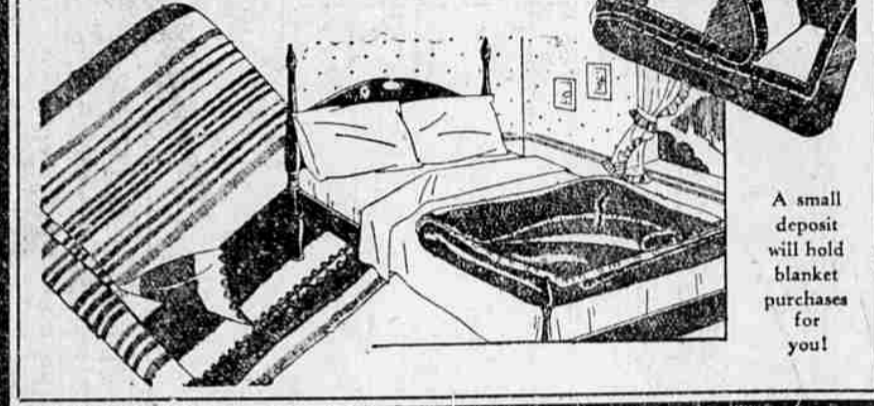
