"The Far Call" Coming Sunday To Colonial

Excitement, interest and romance vie with one another in "The Far Call" which opens at the Colonial Sunday and Monday. This new Allan Dwan production for Fox Films is one of the most convincing sea dramas ever to reach the screen; the tang of salt spray and the chill desolation of the rocky Pribilofs are presented with exceptional realism.

Charles Morton, the youthful Fox meteor, seems to have been born for the part of Loring. He lives the role to perfection, and again proves himself one of the most promising leading men of the screen. Life in Wildest Africa By No Means Boreome

To prove that their life in the interior of wildest Africa, where they retired for four years in order to secure a picture of the native game as it lives undisturbed by man, was by no means an un-civilized existence, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Johnson, whose latest picture, "Simgu," is at the Star Theater, give the following account of one of their average days:

"The Johnsons made their base camp at the edge of a beautiful lake in the crater of an extinct volcano, 'Lake Paradise.'"

Here is Mrs. Johnson's account of an average day:

"The work and boys get up early and at six have breakfast ready for us. Our breakfast menu consists of ham, bacon, kippered herrings, bladders, porridge or liver

once a week.

"As the natives sell us cattle very reasonably we can afford to keep beef whenever we like, and all the fresh milk we want, we churn every third day—one of my favorite jobs.

"At six-thirty the boys are given their day's work—some to go after thatching grass several miles away, others for logs, and others for bush vines to use as rope which often has to take the place of nails for us.

"Any routine work, repairing, digging, washing, cooking, butchering, and other jobs are assigned to the other men.

"There is also a laundry in a special building where the washing is done in big tubs with clean boiling water. Real irons and ironing boards are used and thus we always have fresh clothes and linen.

"By eight o'clock Martin would have his laboratory work done and we would get an early start to whatever general neighborhood we had picked for the photographic work we wanted to do.

"Sometimes when on these tracks we rode camels, sometimes mules, or we walked. A point of note is that if we could find a mule and then went on until a little before sunset, to make camp for the night."

MENUS

Creamed tongue is a delicious and comparatively economical dish too often overlooked by housewives. Calf's tongue is chosen for the creamed dish and it is as delicate as sweetbreads and much less expensive.

Beef tongue is often liked and can be had fresh or cured. This is usually served sliced cold after boiling but can be served in a cream sauce or lightly sauted if a hot dish is wanted.

Tongue has the virtue of being one of those meats which can be prepared for the most part the day before wanted and merely reheated when the time comes for serving.

Crisp potatoes such as shadow or lattice, a tomato and lettuce salad and a fresh fruit dessert are particularly good with creamed tongue for a luncheon menu.

Armed Tongue
Two cups sliced cooked tongue, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, grating of nutmeg.

Boil tongue in salted water and let cool in same water. Peel and trim off rough places about root and cut in small pieces. Melt butter in sauce pan, stir in flour and when bubbling slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Add seasonings and bring to the boiling point. Add tongue and keep over fire just long enough to thoroughly reheat. Serve on a hot platter garnished with small triangles of toast.

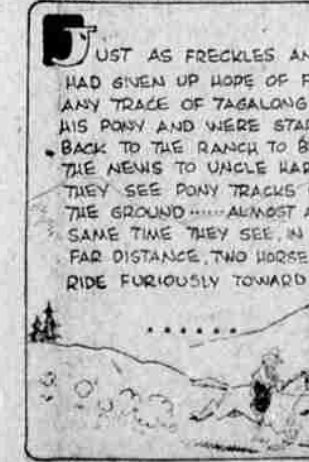
