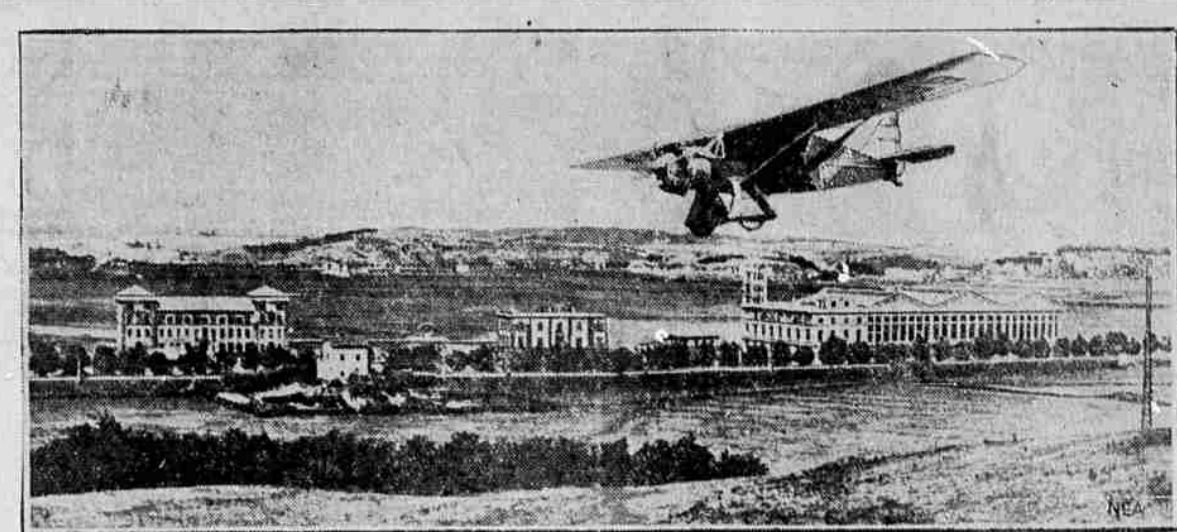

Wallowa Lake Draws Many From East — Surf Riding Tried Sunday

With the peak month—August—approaching, Wallowa Lake Wonderland has completed two months of successful summer season, marked by no one outstanding development or attendance increase, but rather by a consistent widening of the radius of visitors. This was the opinion of John C. Macpherson, manager of the lake, when he was questioned at the lodge yesterday, during another busy Sunday.

"We're getting out-of-state visitors more than ever before, there's no doubt about it," declared Mr. Macpherson, citing examples of visitors from far-east points, and indicating as a specific example, a couple sitting in the lobby who hailed from Iowa. Washington and Idaho cars are increasingly numerous, he said.

"It's the prospect of the mountain trips, out from the lake that is drawing more than chance visitors from far points, believes the lake manager.

"There's more back of those mountains than in any national park in the United States," an eastern visitor, a photographer, recently told him.

Sunday was a particularly busy one as it marked the wind-up of the Epworth League institute, attended last week by nearly 300 young people.

For some of those who sought the beach for amusement Sunday there was the novelty of surf boat riding, a sport yet new to the lake. Privately owned motor boats, among them those of the W. H. Bohnenkamp family, Joe Munhall and Ward Fowler, skim the water nearly every Sunday and give a new beauty to the lake. It was with some of the private motor boats that a few of the more daring attempted surf riding.

It's not always the prospect of a vacation that lures lake visitors, Mr. Macpherson remarked yesterday, naming two botany professors now encamped at the Wonderland to study plant life. SHIFTS COME IN POLITICAL ARENA

Years Brings Unexpected Changes in Lineups of National Parties.

By Francis M. Stephenson (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON (AP)—A year's play of politics has brought some startling switches in the lineups of the national parties.

Herbert Hoover has ascended the party throne to find his former enemies his friends and his friends of the campaign among his opponents today.

It was Senator Watson of Indiana and Vice President Curtis who led the stout-hearted drive of the coalition against the Hoover presidential candidacy in the party battle last year. Today the president counts them as his two trustworthy advisers.

Borah "Breaks"

Senator Borah of Idaho and Senator Brookhart of Iowa waged the valiant Hoover campaign in the doubtful farm areas of the middle west and south last fall. But they were the first to break with the president and they "broke" on the all important issue of farm relief.

Over in the democratic ranks, the outstanding candidates for the presidency in that party's futile campaign—Alfred E. Smith, of New York and James A. Reed of Missouri—have retired to the sidelines of private life, temporarily, at least.

Senator Joe Robinson of Arkansas, democratic leader in the senate and vice-presidential nominee last year, has taken up the task of uniting the minority band for the four-year contest with the Hoover administration. He led with considerable success, too, in the first test, as he twice had the senate insist upon the export duty principle of farm relief over the strong opposition of Herbert Hoover.

What Will Years Bring?

The surprising changes lead to the question of what the new years will bring. Are the rifts between President Hoover and Borah and Brookhart politically serious? Will Senator Robinson's leadership in the senate be a significant point when the democrats cast about for presidential timber?

Borah and Brookhart are in the lead earnest for the export duty farm relief proposition which Mr. Hoover was successful in having eliminated from the agricultural measure passed in the extra session. They are going on with their fight, to have the duty added to the pending tariff bill. Brookhart has called for a presidential candidate who will support the duty.

Vice-President Curtis and Senator Watson are of the school of the "regulars." Once they were defeated at the republican national convention last year, they have among the first to offer their services in the party's campaign.

The body is in charge of Snodgrass & Zimmerman.

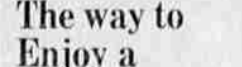
Women's Golf Play Due This Week
