ATTRACTIVE PORCH FEATURED



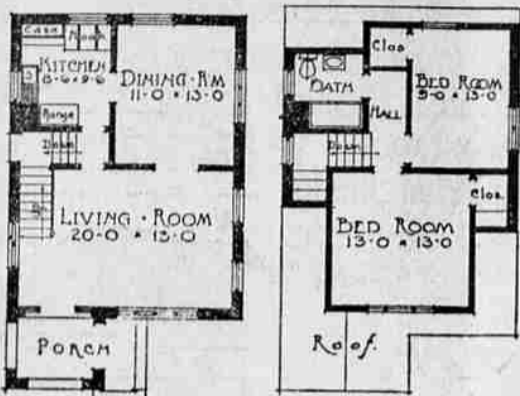

No part of the house is more prominent than the front porch. Its design and general appearance may do a great deal in determining our initial impression and for this reason great care should be exercised in its composition.

In the above type we find battered walls, heavy oak beams, bird house, bushes and flower boxes used to embellish this feature in order to make it as attractive as possible. It is well to note how gracefully the porch roof ties into the dormer and the dormer in turn leading the eye to the main ridge of the roof.

Masonry and stucco construction are employed on the first floor with clapboards or shingles being used in the gables and dormers. Oak flooring is used in the main rooms of the house, single panel doors throughout hung on stately bronze hardware, rough textured plastered walls downstairs, plain walls and ceilings in the bedrooms.

Plumbing fixtures are of enameled iron. Hot air heat is provided and the usual service features, such as laundry trays, etc., are to be found in the basement, which has a cement floor.

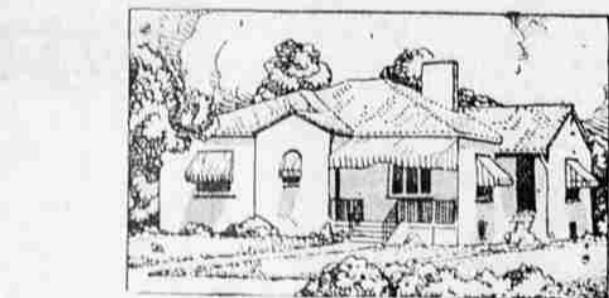
