Huge Explosion In Greece, Is Report
ATHENS, Greece, July 23 (AP)—It was reported here today that there were many casualties and great damage Monday at Soulevo, Bulgaria, when a secret store of munitions accidentally took fire and 3,000 shells exploded.

The newspaper Politikas at Belgrade published what purported to be a suppressed Sofia report a munitions depot near the village of Sewliff exploded recently, wounded 50 persons, some of whom died. Several thousand shells were exploded. It was said the government forbade the press to publish the story.

WILL CONTRACT FOR FLAX
SALEM, Ore., July 23 (AP)—The state board of control has authorized Col. W. B. Bartram, superintendent of the industries at the state penitentiary, to contract with farmers for next year the sowing of 6750 acres of flax for next year's crop. This is an increase of 2250 acres over this year.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23 (AP)—Four condemnation suits were filed in federal court here today against owners of property that will be flooded upon completion of the Owyhee reclamation project dam. All told, the suits involve about 600 acres of land in the valley that will be under water.

Defendants include Perry and Dorothy Mazon, Leonard and Essie Goodwin, Ben and Mrs. Frank and fourteen others.

The government has already purchased much of the property that will be flooded but was unable to agree upon a purchase price with the named owners.
